The Love of God! – In us?

How quickly we move from the Christmas season to thinking about Spring – and Valentine's day will soon be with us with its version of love seen as a romantic feeling of euphoria. Yet as I write this I have just been able to drive up our lane for the first time in 8 days thanks to a local farmer's tractor removing the 3ft. snow drifts yesterday.

And it is in this time of snow, ice & freezing temperatures, with local people snow bound in their own homes, that we have seen examples of profoundly real love. For love as the Bible sees it has far more to do with "giving" than with how we feel or with what we can get - and giving is what our rural communities have been experiencing over these snow bound days. So many in our communities have been only too pleased to offer help with shopping, giving lifts. even cooking for each other so that those who are able to do more have been able to encourage and bring help to those for whom the snow is less than fun. What is it in the human make up that enables us to offer help to our neighbour even when our inclination is to stay inside and keep warm? Why should I feel that I want to offer

help to someone when it is simply not in my interests to do so?

In the Bible's creation account we read that God said ".....let us make man in our image, in our likeness..." and it is this image of God which is embodied in each human being which enables us to show love, not only to those we like, but also to any whom we perceive to be in need. In God's image we are not just animals, motivated by our own genes and instincts alone (although of course these are strongly within us) but we are also capable of showing acts of incredible selflessness whether on the grand scale of a bomb disposal soldier in Afghanistan or by driving down snow covered roads to Tiverton to get shopping for a less able person in our community.

For God is a "Giving" God and the Christian Gospel is a Gospel of unrestricted love by a God who has no need to forgive and love each one of us – but who chooses so to do because it is in His eternal nature. The Apostle John sums this up succinctly when he writes "this is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins". Now there is an act of

generous, unconditional, self giving love! And so at Christmas we celebrated the birth of Jesus who is called "Emmanuel - God with us". On Good Friday we remember that immeasurable act of self giving love on The Cross; and we look forward to Easter day when we celebrate the triumph of love over sin & death. We are challenged to submit to the one who freely offers each of us His gift of unconditional love. We can of course ignore Him, and many choose to do so, but let us remember that true love stems from the very nature of the God who is love. Perhaps we have seen a glimpse of this God given gift of love demonstrated in the community during this time of the "Big Freeze".

But we also owe a great debt of gratitude to all the Readers and (largely retired) clergy who willingly help us maintain our pattern of Sunday worship across the Mission Community. Without their help, producing the monthly service rotas would be a real nightmare.

Please continue to pray for our parish representatives, all who are involved in the selection process, and all who lead our services week by week.
