HAPPY HOLIDAYS?

What does the word 'holiday' mean to you?

To some of us, it means a break from the old routine, a change of scenery, and some peace and quiet. But to others it means traffic jams on the link road, over-crowded beaches, and a distinct lack of peace and quiet. Some of us may even agree with the cynical person who said that all a holiday provides is a different place to be miserable.

But holidays were originally 'holydays': those occasions in the Christian calendar when workers were given an extra day off to mark an important religious festival, like Christmas or Easter. So a holiday was not just a break from the old routine, it was a chance to remember the Lord Jesus and to celebrate all that he has done for us.

The problem with calling some days 'holy-days' is that it implies that all the other days are 'unholy-days'. So we may pay Jesus some attention on the holy-days of Christmas and Easter, but we feel at liberty to ignore him the rest of the time. We may even end up thinking of our Lord as a bit like an elderly relative of whom we are not very fond. We do our duty by visiting him from time to time, but in between visits, we forget all about him.

When Jesus was asked 'What is the greatest commandment?', he replied that it is to "Love the Lord your God

with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength" (Mark 12v30). He obviously expects more from us than an occasional visit on a holy-day. He calls us to be committed to loving Him with every aspect of our being: heart, soul, mind and strength. He wants to be intimately involved in the whole of our lives for the whole of the time, because he loves us so deeply and values us so highly.

For followers of Jesus Christ, every single day is to be a holiday: a day when we remember him and celebrate all that he has done for us.

ANN'S NATURE NOTES

A ugust is the time of high summer; will we get those last, hazy days of summer, or a wet squidgy holiday? This is when the first migrant birds start to return to warmer climes, most of the nestlings have fledged and their parents are moulting, replacing warn feathers and generally recovering from those months of nesting breeding, and feeding their young. At this time one often only sees a few birds in the garden, as they hide to protect themselves from predators.

This is the time for Butterflies. They are on the wing and resting in the sun, if there is any. It is worth walking the footpaths, and looking at the hedgerows and verges; you would be surprised what you can see. Brambles attract many insects, as do their fruits - the Blackberry.

Now you can see Hoverflies, which as their name implies, they hang motionless in the air, in a sunny spot. There are over 250 different species in England. They have only one pair of wings, which twist and flap at over 300 times a second; quite amazing. They come in different shapes and sizes, but the most common are the yellow and black and white ones that look like wasps, which put them in danger of their biggest predator,

man. They are quite harmless, so should be cared for, and they eat nectar and pollen and are one of the most efficient pollinators. The larvae or maggots eat a wide range of food, including rotting vegetable and animal material. They are good guys so need to be cared for.

For an outing this month, why not go to Aylesbeare Common? It used to be a good place to find the rare bird, the Dartford Warbler, but they have really suffered in the past two very cold winters, and I believe that there is only one pair left actually on the common, though another 5 pairs or so are in the area. It is a bit like looking for a needle in a haystack. They eat spiders, and can be seen flying low over the gorse, looking for food. They are resident in the South of England. It is also a good place to find Butterflies and Moths. At dusk Nightjars can be seen if you are lucky. They are very silent fliers.

CHOOSING TO DIE

The Bishop of Exeter's comments on BBC Choosing to Die programme, broadcast on 14th June 2011

The Bishop of Exeter, the Rt Rev'd Michael Langrish, took part in a BBC2 Newsnight debate on Monday 13th June, following the BBC programme 'Choosing to Die' presented by Sir Terry Pratchett. Bishop Michael's main comments from the debate are below:

"I did not change my mind (after seeing the programme) but my expectations changed. I expected I would disagree with the outcome and expected to welcome the film as a contribution to a really important debate but the more I watched it the more concerned and indeed disturbed I became by it. It was very one-sided, a nod to hospice care but no showing the alternative ending, no indication that the two principals Peter and Andrew needn't have been living the life they were leading and right at the end I questioned the whole ethical basis of programme. I felt that Peter and indeed his wife and perhaps Terry Pratchett as well had been caught up and become trapped in the storyline of programme. I felt there was a deeply coercive atmosphere in room in the end and I







felt quite emotionally blackmailed by it."

"I think Terry makes a very important distinction talking about the dignity of life - (I prefer dignity to sanctity) dignity is about what gives worth to every human life. It has to bear on every life not just on a few and my problem here with the emphasis on choice, is that it is alright for us here who have a choice. But take someone like my daughter whose experience of life is having others making choices for her, she's just had her house sold around her with very little choice; it leaves you with a poor sense of self esteem and self worth. What for me gives dignity of life is to say, each of us has a value for what we are not what we do, it's not an instrumental thing and we also find our value in a network of social and community relationships. I want to see much more emphasis on supporting people in living rather than assisting them in dving."

"One of the things that really worried me was right at the end (I realise we probably saw an edited version) Peter lifted the glass of poison and said 'when do I take it?'. I think many doctors, priests, counsellors who had been present at that point would have thought hang on, there's a moment of hesitation here. And the answer was -Do whatever you want"

"On the whole I think the law is clear and the guidelines do broadly work. At present suicide is not a crime but it is not a right. The law still enshrines that sense of the intrinsic value of life. But the law ultimately is not there to constrain individual choice. It's there to constrain third party action and complicity in another person's death. That remains illegal, there may be ameliorating circumstances that can be taken in to account. But the law remains clear and is there to protect the vulnerable. It seems to me the very basis of English law is there to do two things. It is there to protect the



vulnerable in society and should give expression to the deepest values that our society holds."

"I would want to talk about good dying and would love to challenge BBC to do a similar documentary tracking someone like the cabbie through to a good death."

We all take food so much for granted that most of us hardly ever question the sustainability of supplies. However, as the Mayor of New Orleans reminded us a few years ago, we are all just 3 meals away from social breakdown. Furthermore, supermarket supply chains hold only about two weeks of stock and

indeed came close to breaking during the fuel disputes of 2000.

In reality, our food security is not as robust as we might think. In particular, it depends primarily on imported produce, which itself depends on the availability of cheap oil. If oil becomes scarcer and more expensive in future (as it will), our food supplies will be at risk.

Already speculators have been pushing up basic commodity costs on the global markets. This in itself introduces other uncertain factors which we would do well to notice. Are we really like the person who falls off a 10 storey building and, as they pass the 3rd floor on the way down, shouts "so far, so good!"?

Harder times ahead will push us to change two of our practices: firstly, to produce much more food locally in Britain, and secondly, to waste far less than the third of our food that we throw away each day.

The first implies not so much a revolution in farming, but a change towards agriculture which relates more strongly to local people. For instance, there is an increasing number of community food projects in Devon, all of which express greater social involvement in growing our own food and sharing it with others around us. Community farms, garden share schemes, co-operatives, allotments, community food shops, school growing clubs, and so on, are all living examples in our neighbourhoods.

Secondly, as Devon and Cornwall Food Association and other Fairshare schemes demonstrate, there are practical ways to prevent produce from going to landfill or incineration, and can instead be re-distributed at a community level for the benefit of all. We surely cannot keep throwing the future away with our rubbish.

Let's not take the current system for granted but create alternatives that will provide for the future and not for the next fast food meal!
