I did like his turns of phrase, like "submarine Christians" who pop up every now and then, like at Christmas, Easter and funerals! What he had to say was more relevant to town communities than to village parishes who have quite different problems; often villages have certain individual quirks and are fiercely independent.

He divided Christian life into what goes on in church buildings, meetings with food, and outreach. The easiest to cope with is the first, where the church does not move and the services usually are at the same times, so people know what is going on and where. It can become a bit cliquey and it tends to stagnate. The one involving food, be it breakfast, cake or beer is often the best mission opportunity. Outreach is the most difficult and possibly the most important. His message was to play to your strengths and use the best from each area.

## ANN'S NATURE Notes

Now that winter is upon us, it is all change in the natural world.

The Butterflies have either flown to somewhere warmer or are hibernating in cracks or in houses.

There are few flowers, but there are some flowering shrubs, especially ivy, which are rich in nectar and attract insects - a good meal for birds.

The summer breeding migrants have returned to the warmth for their winter holidays, but they have had a long flight to get to their destinations. The winter migrants are now here, mostly the waders, and water birds. Woodcocks are in the woods, but

are very shy and are very difficult to see, as they are so well camouflaged, and hide in the bracken. They are waders, though live in damp woods, which is a surprise to most people. The Widgeons have come back in their hundreds. They are brown ducks with a very distinctive yellow wedge at the top of their head. They eat grass and can be seen in large flocks round the edges of ponds and lakes. Their call is a whistle, very distinctive. Over the shoreline, if the weather is fine, one can see flocks of Dunlins, with the silver under-wing shining in the sunlight. The winter thrushes are in abundance, finishing off the berries.

## **HOLY TIME**

One of the often overlooked insights from our Christian teaching is the wisdom that not only is <u>space</u> (the created order) sacred as a gift of God, but so also is <u>time</u>.

Biblically, this is expressed partly in the Sabbath (Shabbat) tradition as explicit, for example, in the fourth commandment. The seventh day is to be remembered and respected as a special period of holiness. Some theologians would even say it is the pinnacle of Creation – the completion of God's work in shaping the Universe.

The need for our society to have a time of rest and re-creation, in which we review our lives, and in which debts can be written off, land re-distributed and all wrongs put to right, is central to our faith and found in the words of the Lord's Prayer.

It is also extremely relevant in today's 24/7 culture where there is no stopping the consumer-driven urges to shop all day and all night. The onslaught of a busy society in which we value ourselves by what we possess – we are what we have - is incessant. We work only to own more "play things". Thus we become involved in idolatry – when our possessions possess us. Meanwhile, the energy required from fossil fuels to allow us to do this is enormous and wasteful, with one of the by-products being Climate Change induced by greenhouse gas emissions.

Some use the term 'time-pollution', when the activity we do next is seen as more important than what we are doing now! Surely we need to re-examine our attitudes.

A holy time apart, whether in a few minutes, a whole day, an entire year or a liturgical season, calls us away from the driven-ness of insatiable lifestyles, and points us in the direction of more sustainable ways of living. Our human potential is not to be found in what we own and how we hold on to it, but in our ability to develop caring relationships with other people and with the Earth, through which God is experienced as a force of love.

Happiness is ultimately to be discovered in how we live meaningful, engaging and joyfull lives. To this end we all need time away from the images and messages of advertising and to reduce the impact we

## A GUIDE TO MODERN LIVING

"Make do and mend" –not just because it's more "eco-friendly" but because it's better for your mental health. Working with our hands is ingrained in our DNA and the self-esteem and confidence that result from fixing something that was broken or making something from scratch have measurable effects on mental and also therefore, on physical well-being.

"Stop multi-tasking". We can't think of more than one thing at a time. Trying to do so just leads to stress and lowers your ability to do anything properly. When access to social networking sites was turned off at Harrisburg University as an experiment, students initially complained but afterwards reported greater attention and understanding of lectures and found they were more out-going and sociable.

"Get out and about more". Get yourself out in the garden or go for a walk. Being confined by the walls of a building or a car is not very stimulating for the brain; everything you see is more or less predictable whereas in the natural world everything is constantly changing. The brain reacts well to this seeming randomness so that for example, people learn better after a walk in the countryside than they do after an urban walk and patients in hospital recover better if they can see trees outside their windows.

"Keep electronic communication in its place" Sociable people live nearly four years longer than people who are unsociable, but this means face to face communication, not the "Facebook" type. Remember much of our communication is non-verbal!

"Be happy at your work". Often easier said than done but researchers find that people are up to 12% more productive after being shown a film that makes them feel happy. If you're lucky enough to be a manager of other people you'll surely find them being more productive if they feel valued and appreciated.

And what's all this got to do with being environmentally friendly? Not a huge amount, except that we seem to have lost our way in so many ways, of which the above ones are only a few,-and we are worse off as a result. We don't really seem to know it yet because we've been seduced by the good life, paid for by cheap energy. The really big thing we're getting wrong and only just beginning to see, is that we're wrecking the planet. The planet will adapt and survive of course, but many humans will struggle...

### THE GREEN BIBLE

The Green Bible was first published by Collins in 2008. It is a special edition of the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) which is printed using sustainably produced resources with a foreword by Archbishop Desmond Tutu.

It is particularly remarkable as it highlights in green ink those texts which are more obviously explicit references to the Earth and the Environment. These include familiar passages such as Genesis 1, Psalm 104 and Romans 8, but also many more less known which together give a stronger ecological sense to these Jewish and Christian scriptures. Over 1,000 creation care comments are identified.

The book contains a Green Bible Trail Guide and a myriad of other references and resources. A collection of quotes from a variety of writers from the Early Church through to the current Ecumenical Patriarch is very useful compilation of complimentary voices to the Biblical texts.

Finally, essays contributed by respected conservationists and theologians emphasise important creation themes and how to read the Bible through a 'green lens'.

This is a great tool for anyone wanting to reconnect faith and ecology, and exploring the significance of scripture for this much needed adventure.

The Green Bible is available in most bookshops. It is accompanied by the Bible Society's <u>'Poverty and Justice Bible'</u> (Contemporary English Version), which indicates the thousands of references to social justice and exclusion central to the biblical message of hope and life for all.
