FAITH OR FUN?

So often the Christian is portrayed as either a killjoy or a wimp. Maybe we sometimes deserve this image, but on other occasions I suggest it might be brought about by a psychological fear on behalf of the non believer that there is more to this "Christian " thing than we might want to think.

How common it is in our TV shows for the vicar to be portrayed as an inadequate person who is barely able to cope with the reality of life in the real world – one who has retreated into a make believe existence behind the walls of his mediaeval building. Certainly the vicar in one of my favourite comedy shows – Dad's Army – (that dates me!) falls into this category. Not only is he an inadequate who shelters behind his religiosity but he is about the only character in the cast who is not at all funny! Typical Christian we are led to believe!

How different the lifestyle of the believer that the Bible portrays to us. We see Jesus Himself joining in celebrations at a wedding and saving the party from embarrassing disaster by producing additional wine. The word "Joy" or "Joyful " appear about 240 times in the Bible in such phrases as "the joy of The Lord is your strength" and "the disciples were filled with joy". The Apostle Paul outlines the Christian life in these words "May the God of hope fill you with all joy & peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit".

These sentiments have come to me as we considered the question of the purposes of Holiday Club - is the purpose of this annual event to give the children a fun time OR to teach them about faith in Jesus? And it is that word "OR" which is the problem! Yes, Holiday club will give the children – and teenagers in the evening – a good time, we can be confident of that as those who have attended over the years can testify. But the overarching purpose of both the day events for the children and the evenings for the helpers is to introduce people to The Lord Jesus Christ and to help them forward in their Christian faith. So many of us can say from experience that our joy, our purpose and our hope for the future in an uncertain world come from our faith in the living Lord Jesus – he is the fount of all "joy and peace in believing". For if I thought that we were introducing them to the long faced wimpish religiosity of the Dad's army vicar, I would not support it for one moment!

OUR ANGLICAN FUTURE

Visit of Rev'd Charles Raven.

Charles Raven will be staying in one of our parishes as a private guest for about 2 weeks at the beginning of August. Charles has been invited to preach in some our services on the 5th & 12th of August. In addition he will be leading an evening session in Loxbeare Hall on 8th August at 7.30pm with the above title. We do hope many will take this opportunity of hearing Charles – the issues he will be speaking about are those we will all have to think about in the coming years irrespective of where we stand on the issues concerned.

Charles has recently been appointed as Archbishop's Officer for Anglican Communion Affairs to the Archbishop of Kenya, who is Chairman of the Fellowship



Crediton EX17 2BR www.symesrobinsonlee.co.uk of Confessing Anglicans, a body representing the majority of Anglican believers world-wide. Thika diocese in Kenya is one of the dioceses with which we in Exeter are linked.

Charles has been at the forefront of the fight to maintain Biblical faith in the Anglican Communion. He was vicar of St John's Kidderminster when the debate about homosexually active clergy within the Church of England started to hot up in the late 1990s and, in 1999, his then bishop very publicly rejected agreed Anglican teaching.

Like so many of us, he was concerned that Biblical standards be maintained within the church and, following discussions with the bishop, Charles and his congregation decided they could not accept his spiritual authority. Eventually he felt he had no option but to lead his congregation away from the parish church for the sake of a local Anglican future, and in 2002 he became Rector of Christ Church Wyre Forest, an Anglican Church outside the formal structures of the Church of England, and which is now part of the Anglican Mission in England.

The issues which confronted Charles in 1999 increasingly confront many in the Church of England today. Charles has continued to play a very active role in Anglican affairs world wide culminating in his key appointment in Kenya

In short, Charles will be talking to us in the meeting on the 8th August about our future as Anglican Christians in the light of present trends within the Church of England.

The Heritage Lottery Fund application involves us in organising a great many activities designed to promote learning, participation and conservation of church bells and bell ringing within the community.

We have just started some of our planned activities and are very grateful to Rackenford Church for allowing us to use their bells to teach some of the Rackenford school children to ring. We began with a 'teach the teachers' session on two consecutive mornings, when some of our ringers had the opportunity to learn 'how to teach' from three experienced members of the Guild of Devonshire Rinaers. Three Rackenford school children (and their Headmistress) kindly agreed to be guinea pigs for us to practise on. We are now continuing to teach these children, together with others, once a week at lunchtime.

ANN'S NATURE NOTES

he summer is the time of sunshine, and holidays, let's hope! Butterflies should be at their busiest then, but so far this year, they have been in small numbers because of the dreadful weather. The resident birds are, on the whole, moulting, so go into hiding. They have had a busy time laying eggs: brooding them and feeding young has taken a lot out of them, and they need to regroup and grow new feathers. The migrant birds are beginning to return to warmer climes. I was surprised to read that Cuckoos start to return in late June. the Swifts start to go in late July, and the rest follow in their own time.

Possibly, because of climate change, new birds are nesting in England for the first time; Great White Egrets are nesting on Sedgemoor, Spoonbills are somewhere, not sure where, and there are more Glossy Ibises appearing in the South West.

For a walk I think, along the Tiverton Canal, park either in Tiverton at the beginning, or the Jubilee Bridge, Sampford Peverell, or Burlescombe. There are many Dragonflies and darters there, as well as Butterflies.

DEANERY SYNOD

Thursday 28th June 2012.

Bishop Richard Hawkins commis-sioned Rev'd Barry Dugmore as the new Rural Dean. The church warden of Bampton spoke on behalf of Rev'd Lynne



Burgon on her experiences developing mission in a rural context.

We had a plenary session on what is, and what is not, working to encourage mission. Then there was a feedback. This is a good idea as it gives us a picture as to what is happening elsewhere in the deanery. We do need to work together and get ideas of what might help us. The picture I got was that Steve has managed to do a lot of things in the parish that were mentioned. The results were divided into strengths. weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. The strengths included holiday clubs, Toddler groups, lunch and breakfast clubs, street pastors, special services and ecumenical linking. Weaknesses included vicars being spread too thinly, geography of rural areas, finance and communication problems. Opportunities included using secular events like the Jubilee to include non churchgoers, outward fundraising and working in schools. Threats include peoples' reaction, fear of

change, very small congregations in village parishes, parochialism. It gave food for thought.

There was a report from Diocese. The al Synod discussed many subjects including assisted dying, training of ordinands, parochial fees, the code of practice of ordination of women, aid to poorer countries, concern about the events in Nigeria, new Eucharistic prayers, and the Health service. I am sure that you will agree it is a very wide range of subjects.
