Each day the helper team began with a time of bible study and prayer. This was a good chance for those volunteering to meet with Christ themselves before teaching the same passage to the children. It also helped remind us that the Bible is not a book for kids, but one in which Jesus Christ speaks to all people, however young or old.

Each morning the club began at 11.15, with the morning being taken up with crafts, games, drama, bible readings, a DVD, bible teaching, and worksheets on the bible passage. It was great to see the children understanding more about who Jesus is (The Lord of all), what he has come to do (rescue sinful people through his death on the cross), and what it means to follow him (to turn to him in faith, and live by his word). A particular highlight was the memory verse 1 Peter 1:18 – which both linked to our Olympic theme "silver" and "gold" and was taught each day by curate Robert Brewis and youth worker Katie Benjamin, dressed up as TV's 118 men.

The afternoons were spent enjoying games with the indefatigable Ron Tidball, and a variety of crafts brilliantly organised by Cindy Trick and Alison Webber. Through the week we had great weather, with temperatures in the low 30s most days. This made for a great time and having lots of fun outdoors.

A new feature to the week was the Sunday fun day. It was great to see many people enjoy the Sunday holiday club service (there were about 100 children and adults), and then stay for a picnic lunch, bouncy castle, splat the rat, face painting, biscuit making, juggling balls, graffiti wall and football.

In the evenings a good time was had with the teenagers too. We enjoyed games, a



BBQ, a chocolate fountain and had fun times of discussion thinking about topics like 'Was Jesus real?', 'Is the Bible reliable?', 'Has science disproved God?', and 'Is God a kill-joy?'.

Overall we are thankful to God for such a fun and safe time, for the fact that many children heard the gospel, and for all those who gave up their time to help make the week possible. We pray on that the children might come to a real and saving faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

We have set the dates for next year's club – it will begin on Tuesday the  $30^{th}$  of July and run on the  $31^{st}$ ,  $1^{st}$ ,  $2^{nd}$ , (no club on Saturday), and  $4^{th}$  of August. Do put it in your diaries, we would love to see as many as possible!

#### **OUR ANGLICAN FUTURE**

(Report of Talk by Revd. Charles Raven in Loxbeare Hall on 8th August).

Charles has been at the forefront of the fight to maintain Biblical faith in the Anglican Communion. He was vicar of St John's Kidderminster when the debate about homosexually active clergy within the Church started to hot up in the late 1990s, and in 1999 his then bishop very publicly rejected agreed Anglican teaching.

Charles spoke to about 20 of us in Loxbeare Hall. Having outlined his experience up to the time when he and his congregation decided that they could no longer accept the authority of his then Bishop, Charles took us through the years that followed. He spoke of his church's loneliness until the advent of the Global Anglican Futures Conference (GAFCON) in Jerusalem in 2008, when Bishops representing the majority of Anglicans worldwide (many of whom felt unable in conscience to attend the Lambeth conference) met in Jerusalem for what turned out to be a landmark conference, setting in motion the formation of the Fellowship of Confessing Anglicans. Charles explained that the word "confessing" is used in the classical sense of "believing a set of truths" and that the essence of the GAFCON movement is that Anglicanism is concerned with a common set of beliefs as set out in the Book of Common Prayer, the 39 Articles and the Ordinal.

Charles spoke of how, following GAFCON, he and Gillian felt that they had "Come Home" and were again accepted into the Anglican Church worldwide. The FCA led in turn to the formation of the Anglican Mission in England which is enabling parishes and churches who are unable to accept the authority of their Bishops to find an alternative Anglican home in the family of those who remain faithful to historic Anglican fellowship and teaching.

Charles was at pains to point out that the present issues in these matters were not restricted to the "gay" issue of Christian lifestyle. He mentioned that basic Christian beliefs, such as the uniqueness of Christ, the incarnation and the virgin birth, were also under attack in some quarters.

This may all seem rather distant to us in Exeter diocese, where we are thankful for the publicly orthodox teaching and leadership of our Bishops, but it is a real blessing in those cases where Bishops seem determined to change the belief and practice of the church. This is so in a small number of cases in the UK at present, but is much more common in the USA and Canada.

Charles then went on to explain his new appointment in Kenya where he is to be the Archbishop's Officer for Anglican Communion Affairs, the Archbishop of Kenya being the chairman of the FCA worldwide and of the GAFCON movement. Thika diocese in Kenya is one of the dioceses with which we in the Exeter diocese are twinned.

Charles and Gillian moved to Kenya at the beginning of September, and ask for our prayers for them as they take up this vital role in the worldwide Anglican Church.

## **ANN'S NATURE NOTES**

Well now, again, it is all change in the migration world. Our summer visitors have left for warmer climes, some went very early because of our uninviting summer, and we are now getting our winter visitors, especially ducks and geese. There has been a lot of research recently on these migrants. I have referred to the work on Cuckoos, now I have read an article on Woodcock. Some breed in Britain but most spend the summer in the Baltic region. One called Monkey, was tagged on the Lizard, and has been found to fly over 6,200,km to central Russia. That was quite an achievement.

This year we have seen few butterflies around, probably due to the poor summer. Knowing Mother Nature, no doubt they will bounce back next year. It seems to have been a good year for wild flowers. My daughter-in-law gave me a wild flower book for my birthday, and as a start we went round the garden to see what was there. Afterwards, over tea, she said "Oh it is so nice to find so many wild flowers in a garden".... Ho hum, maybe my weeding is not so good! But there were an awful lot and quite a variety.

This is when the twitchers rush round England chasing rarities that have appeared here by mistake. They really are a dedicated lot, and go miles to find the lesser spotted whatever. The birds are more difficult to identify as, except for the Robin, they do not sing, only make contact calls, and are in their duller winter plumage. The winter Thrushes will be back, and then they will eat our holly berries if it is cold.

I think that one of the most interesting places to visit may be the nature reserve at the Axe estuary. A lot of birds are found there, and then enjoy the walk afterwards along the seashore on a bright windy autumn day.

## BUZZARDS, Withleigh

The National Trust is inviting locals to comment and contribute ideas for improving the popular 'Buzzards' woodland in Withleigh. Buzzards was gifted to the National Trust in the 1960s and 70s. The previous owner donated the site in memory of his late wife and called it Buzzards after the raptors they used to enjoy watching there.

Buzzards is a beautiful wooded valley with rich meadows which are a haven for butterflies such as Silver-washed Fritillaries, Speckled Wood and Green-veined White, Large Skipper and Demoiselle, Small Copper, Red Admiral and Hairstreak.

There is no intention to develop the site, however there are plans to enhance the existing network of circular walks to improve conditions underfoot for year round public access. The woodland would also benefit from thinning the tree cover to let in more sunlight for bluebells and wildflowers colonising the woodland floor.

Ed Nicholson, National Trust Area Warden and Forester manages Buzzards, he said: "The Trust is keen to be as well known for our countryside as we are for our mansions and gardens. Buzzards is one of mid-Devon's hidden countryside gems and is almost like a place that time forgot. It's a truly special place used and loved by the local community and therefore we recognise the importance of taking into account the community's needs when making plans for any improvements."

National Trust welcomes comments and suggestions to help shape the vision for the site, particularly from local dog walkers and horse riders who regularly visit. The Trust would also like to hear from people interested in volunteering for the National Trust by helping to take care of Buzzards from time to time. Volunteer tasks would include surveying wildlife and assisting the Countryside Team with carrying out conservation work.
