Christmas is a time of year that can make us painfully aware of the gulf that exists between the rich and the poor. Many of us simply cannot afford the kind of Christmas that we dream about, with heaps of extravagant gifts under the tree and tables laden with delicious food and drink. Some of us will go heavily into debt in order to pay for such a Christmas, and will then start the new year with a nasty shock when the credit card bill arrives.

Perhaps we are resentful towards those who can still afford a lavish celebration, but who we feel do not deserve to enjoy one. Perhaps we envy those who have a larger turkey and Christmas tree than we do. Perhaps we even get into a competitive mindset, and spend more money than we can really afford in order to out-do our friends and neighbours.

Christmas is meant to be a celebration of peace and goodwill. How sad that resent-

ment and envy so easily creep in and dominate our horizons. How tragic that giving to charity often decreases over the Christmas period, whilst the number of marital breakdowns increases. Instead of generosity, there is often selfishness. And instead of peace and goodwill, there are often simmering tensions or blazing rows over the Christmas pudding!

We do well to remember that the very first Christmas was marked not by luxury and self-indulgence, but by poverty and selfsacrifice. As the Apostle Paul reminds his



readers in 2 Corinthians 8 verse 9: "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich"

The Lord Jesus Christ willingly gave up his place in glory in order to come into our broken and fallen world. He was born in poverty and humility and he died in poverty and humility. And he did so to make us rich! Not rich in material things, of course – Jesus Christ died in our place so that we can receive the treasures of peace with God and eternal security. These unspeakably great riches can be ours as free gifts, simply by putting our trust in the

> one who became poor to win them for us. Through his poverty we can become truly rich.

So what will dominate our thoughts this Christmas? Will it be envy and resentment at the gulf which exists between the rich and the poor? Or will it be wonder and gratitude at the gulf which Jesus Christ crossed, going from the heights of heaven to the depths of hell, so that we might go from the depths of hell to the heights of heaven?

True joy, contentment and riches are only found through faith in the one who became poor in order that we might become rich. May we all know that joy this Christmastime.

### **ANN'S NATURE NOTES**

Now winter has started, the butterflies are hibernating or have gone south, the flowers have had their season and are resting. The summer migrants have long gone to find some sun. Some have seemed to have gone early. Now our winter migrants have arrived, so we have lots of ducks and geese here, grazing on grass. Often they are in their thousands. If we are lucky there will be hoar frosts which are so beautiful, giving a shimmering edge to branches and seed heads. Frosts help to kill bugs like aphids and slugs so make the flowers healthier in the spring. At this time of the year the Hawthorne comes into its own. It is a plant for all seasons. The blossom in the spring has pollen for the pollinators, the thorny growth is for nesting birds, there is foliage for moth caterpillars, and the juicy berries at this time of the year are for the Thrushes.

Now is a good time to put up bat boxes. Bats are fussy creatures and it is often best to put up several, all facing in different directions so that they can choose for themselves where they want their home. They do not like draughts, and they like the boxes high up. They do not like treated wood. When they hibernate their heartbeat drops to two beats a minute and they live off a hibernation fat.

I think the best outing for the month is a visit to Rosemore, where they have a lovely winter garden.

### HOW TO WRECK A Church

t has been tried across the centuries – in public arenas, through mob violence and by official banning. In the first three centuries of the New Testament church, ten massive persecutions took place, and the Roman emperor Diocletian even had a medal struck – inscribed with the boast, 'The Christian religion is destroyed, and the worship of the gods is restored.' But – as Bishop William Greer of Manchester once told his critic during a TV interview –

Those might sound like brave words only, were it not for the assurance of Jesus Christ that the gates of hell itself will not prevail against the Church.

We Christians today are astonished, not so much at the ever-continuing advance in the 2.3 billion-strong family of Jesus Christ worldwide, but rather at the amazing failure of our critics to learn from history. Naturally we weep when a Janani Luwum, or a Mehdi Dibaj is martyred. Such martyrs are numbered by the thousand today, as they were twenty But the sweep of centuries ago. civilization indicates that the greater the pressure on the church from its outside persecutors, the stronger tends to be its arowth.

The atheist Philip Pulman has declared, 'Without a doubt Christianity will cease to exist in a few years.' He might have done better to heed the historian, T.R. Glover, 'The final disappearance of Christianity has been prophesied so often as to be no longer interesting.'

And yet a church CAN be wrecked. To read the letters of the New Testament is to understand that although persecution from outside was bitter and powerful, the real dangers arose from men within the church's boundaries, who - like others of 'broad' outlook who were to follow them -'creep into the ministry, but they are generally cunning enough to conceal the breadth of their minds beneath Christian phraseology' (C.H. Spurgeon, college address, 1874).

A prime example of the New Testament warnings occurs in Paul's letter to Titus, appointed to lead the church in Crete. Writing of such false teachers, the apostle declares, 'They claim to know God, but by their actions they deny him. They are



Crediton EX17 2BR www.symesrobinsonlee.co.uk detestable, disobedient and unfit for doing anything good' (Titus 1:16).

'Detestable ....' Paul is not writing of the Roman empire (of which Crete became a part in 67 AD). Nor was he fearful of other religions. Zeus was supposedly born in Crete, and Bacchus was also worshipped there – but Zeus and Bacchus, together with Osiris, Jupiter, Artemis and a host of other deities would all have to move aside with the preaching of Jesus. The real enemy was from within. The false

teachers within the Church were plausible in their appearance – 'claiming to know God'; they were human in their authority presenting 'the commands of men who reject the truth' (the correct reading of v. 14)): they were rebellious in their attitudes - 'rebellious people, mere talkers and deceivers.'

What is it about false teaching? First it dazzles, finding its ways into magazines and onto TV news programmes and book displays. It also deceives - drawing the

unwary half a degree off course. It then distorts, for the principle of the everwidening angle will eventually see church members ten years down the line embracing teachings that are far removed from Scripture. And, finally, it destroys. Congregations slowly die. And the brilliant shooting star that had once drawn gasps from admirers drops into the darkness and is forgotten. The books end up in Oxfam shops, but the damage has been done.

The identikit of Crete's false teachers is not uncommon throughout the story of the Church. The teachings may vary across a wide range, spanning between the blatancy of a Bishop Spong ('We wrote the Bible; we can re-write the Bible') to the extremism of semi-sectarianism that asserts, 'Yes, the Cross is important – but we've moved on further now.' How do false teachers come across?

Titus was urged to recognize them as the big talkers (1: 10); also as the peacebreakers, upsetting and dividing whole households and fellowships. They were to be recognised as the truth-warpers, with their twisting of a single issue into a major mandatory tenet. Such has always been the case. Ultimately they were the deathbrokers, for just as all things that the pure ever touch tend to result in purity, so all that the 'corrupted' deal with will end in corruption (1:15).

That, very largely, is how a church becomes wrecked. It happens from within.

The question always lies before Bible people and Gospel people; how are false leaders in the Church to be resisted? The answer is the same as that given to Titus. First - we are to silence them by our teaching (v. 11), and never to give in - but rather to out-preach them. We are also to correct them by our firmness (v. 13) - with the aim of winning them around. This may have to include 'fencing' the pulpit, monitoring the bookstall and guarding church leadership appointments (v.5-9). Further, we are to expose them by our very lifestyle (v.16). As often as not, false teaching will finally betray its nature in its boasting, lying, sexual deviation, cheating and avarice (v.12).

Self-control and self-vigilance on our own part are vital, 'so that in every way we may make the teaching about God our Saviour



attractive' (2:10. The alternative is.... Detestable.

#### Something to celebrate

After much fund-raising, including the generous sum of £44,000 under the Your Heritage scheme of the Heritage Lottery Fund, the renovation of the bells and conservation of the 15th century bosses and wall-plates at St Margaret's Church, Stoodleigh, is now complete.

To celebrate this, there was a concert in the church in early November given by



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Con Spirito (eight thrilling unaccompanied voices) and Stick the Fiddle (fiddle, guitar and string bass). It was wonderful to welcome these two talented groups to the church, where the splendid acoustics were greatly appreciated by performers and audience alike. Many attended, and the church looked a picture with wall-plates and bosses at their best (!) and beautiful flowers. The music was sometimes sublime, often humorous and always celebratory. There was wine and cheese to follow.

The work to install a new bell-frame was finished in February 2011; now the conservation work has been completed on the exceptional 15th century 'Green Man' wall plates which surround the nave and the 33 roof bosses. To have accomplished all this in just over three years (fundraising began in July 2009 after the bells had been condemned in July 2008) is a major achievement, and much praise and thanks to all those involved in this massive project.

The truth is that none of it would have happened without the determined efforts of one woman... So let's hear it for Jennifer!

Appeal for help: The church is in desperate need of someone to take over winding the clock, which has been done for so many years by Edward Hill. This is a regular commitment at the same time every week, as the clock does not run for much longer than 168 hours! Fitness is fairly important as, apart from the work involved in winding the clock, the tower has a number of stone stairs to climb. FEEDING OUR FUTURE

This has been a difficult year for farming and food production across the world, particularly because of chaotic weather patterns, including in the UK. The likely consequences of poor global harvest through excessive rain or drought will be higher food commodity prices. This inevitably means more expensive produce in our shops, which will especially affect the poorest sections of our communities. Food poverty is sadly set to increase in the months ahead.

At the same time, the longer term future is not looking promising either. Climate Change and rising energy costs will mean uncertainties of food production and food security. The choice of growing crops for fuel rather than for food compounds the matter.

If we add to this a realisation that around the world a quarter of our soil is threatened by erosion, salinity, loss of organic matter and contamination, plus we are losing fertile land to rapid urban expansion, and the outlook is disturbing. Some call this the phenomenon of 'Peak Soil' and together these massive challenges must prompt us to deeply examine our food policies and practices.

At the Devon Food Conference held near Crediton in October 2012, it was emphasized that it is importance that Devon be able to provide more of its own food in the future. This may mean revising farming policy which encourages high grade agricultural land to be sold off for development. We should not lose our local food culture, skills, land and resources at this time but move towards more low-input farming and support community food initiatives.

In addition, we cannot go on discarding and destroying one third of our good food every day. Our current food industries encourage too much waste in a world of growing need. That is why projects like the Devon & Cornwall Food Association which redistribute in-date food to local charities around Exeter and Plymouth are to be supported.
