# ARE CHRISTIANS CALLED TO BE TOLERANT?

As the church in our land experiences growing levels of internal division and external conflict, we are frequently urged to be tolerant. A recent article in a national newspaper insisted that tolerance was at the heart of the Christian creed. This idea is so widely repeated that it is generally taken for granted, but a few moments of reflection reveal that it is nonsense.

'Tolerance' cannot be a good thing in and of itself, because it all depends what you are willing to tolerate. It is certainly not virtuous to tolerate evil or injustice. No-one in their right mind would suggest that it is a good thing to tolerate child abuse. Evil must be confronted and challenged, never tolerated. Of course, there are some matters about which we must be highly tolerant, but sometimes it is good and right to be very intolerant!

Followers of Jesus have a much higher calling than tolerance. The Bible does not call us to tolerate our neighbours or tolerate our enemies, but to love them. The difference between tolerance and love is that tolerance is passive whereas true love must always be active.

Tolerance simply says 'Live and let live' – 'You go your way and I'll go my way'. But love actively seeks what is best for other people, and it does so in a way that is costly and sacrificial. Love puts itself out in order to put other people first. The Lord Jesus said, "Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (John 15v13).

This kind of radical love will sometimes make us unpopular. To speak out against evil and to stand up for God's ways are some of the most loving things we can ever do, but they do not always lead to popularity (as many of the Old Testament prophets learned to their cost).

The Lord Jesus is the most loving and compassionate person ever to set foot on planet earth, yet he was ready to challenge vigorously those who rejected God's ways. His intolerance of hypocrisy and wickedness did not make him popular, but his call to repentance arose from his deep love and compassion for other people. Those who follow him and the church which bears his name are therefore not called to cheap tolerance but to costly love.

The churchwardens will be considering at future meetings how administration will be covered, but it is the production of this magazine which may turn out to be the major issue.

# ANN'S NATURE NOTES

Now we are in the bleak midwinter, there is still a lot to see, and if the weather is dry and sunny it is a joy to be out. There will be no butterflies; they have mostly emigrated. The lovely Painted Lady has gone to Africa. It has always been a bit of a mystery as to where and when they go, but now research has shown that they fly very high at over 500metres and at speeds of up to 50kph. The extraordinary thing is that they have found that they do the 9,000 mile round trip in steps, and by successive generations, so the butterfly which returns in the summer may be 6 generations removed from the one that left. They are indeed sophisticated as well as being very beautiful.

This is the time to see our winter visiting birds. There are of course ducks, geese, and waders on the water or near it, but in our gardens there are the winter Thrushes. The Redwings are small with an eye stripe, and reddish orange under their wings. They actually breed in either Iceland or Scandinavia, and come to us to escape the cold. If it is too cold here they go further south to France. The Fieldfare is much bigger and greyer with a dark tail. They do tend to go round in flocks. They breed in Scandinavia and Russia. Both like apples so if it is cold, put some cut up in your garden.

The Snowdrops are showing and starting to flower, as are the yellow Aconites and the Cyclamen under the trees. Both are harbingers of spring and of warmer times. I love the start of spring when the bulbs are starting to show, and the weather warms and things start to dry out, and walking without sinking into the mud. One of my favourite places to visit is Isley Marsh near Bideford. There you will see
