HANDING ON THE BATON

Fans of athletics will remember a number of occasions over recent years when the British men's relay team has made a mess of handing over the baton. Once or twice they were even in a medal-winning position, when a poorly judged handover put them out of contention. It must be particularly frustrating for the earlier runners who had faithfully played their part, only to see their chances thrown away by the carelessness of a later runner.

In one of his letters to his apprentice named Timothy, the Apostle Paul stressed the need to be very careful in handing over the baton of the Christian gospel to the next runner. In 2 Timothy 2v2, Paul wrote: "The things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses, entrust to reliable people who will also be qualified to teach others".

As he approached the end of his earthly life, Paul saw the need to preserve the authentic message about Jesus Christ by ensuring that it was passed on to the next generation (Timothy), and to ensure that Timothy, in turn, passed on the baton to his successors. Paul realised that the church is only ever one generation away from death. If one generation fails to pass on the baton, or if one generation fails to take up the baton, the church will cease to exist. The building may remain standing as a museum piece, but the church will be no more.

As I have got to know the nine churches of the Exe Valley Mission Community over the last three years, I have frequently been both impressed and humbled by the faithfulness of the older generation in keeping the churches There are some who have going. laboured and prayed for decades to sustain the life of their Christian community. Sometimes they are more than ready to hand over the baton to the next generation, only to find that the next generation is not prepared to step up to the mark and to take on the responsibility for the church in their parish. So the older saints feel compelled to keep going, even though they have already run their leg of the race and should, by now, be enjoying a well-deserved rest from their labours.

I want to challenge the younger generation to consider how we are going to respond to this situation. The more mature saints cannot go on forever. Unless some younger ones are willing to take a more active role, the future of the churches of the Exe Valley is in jeopardy. We will surely not stand idly by, and allow our churches to grind to a halt? The baton of the Christian gospel has been handed on from one generation to the next for many hundreds of years, and now it is our turn to receive the baton and to run with it.

REFLECTIONS ON THE SABBATH AND OUR PLANET

We often take Genesis 1 to imply that human beings are the crown of God's creation. Humanity was created after





the animals on the sixth day, but it is the seventh day, or Sabbath day, that God blesses and sets apart as different from all the other days. It is the Sabbath day that is the crown of God's creation; the crown of creation is God-centred and not humancentred. We could even say that God built a continual reminder that we are not in charge into the very rhythm of reality.

In Leviticus, we read of God's commandment about how the people of Israel were to live on the land. "Six years you shall sow your field, and six years you shall prune your vineyard, and gather in their yield; but in the seventh year there shall be a Sabbath of complete rest for the land." (Lev 25:3-4) So not only is the seventh day a day of rest for the people, but the seventh year is a year of rest for the land. But the people of Israel did not "observe my statutes and faithfully keep my ordinances, so that you may live on the land securely" (v18). They exploited the land, and did not let it rest. In working it each year, they drew up salts from the depths that poisoned the surface. They chopped down the cedars of Lebanon to build the kingdom. They over-reached themselves, became a failed state, and were taken into exile.

There are clear parallels with what is happening today. For many years, we have gone after the false god of economic growth, underpinned by cheap oil and other resources of the earth. But it is just not sustainable. We have one planet, and it cannot support continual growth. The WWF has calculated that we would need to have more than three planets if

everyone in the world consumed as much as people in the UK.

It doesn't have to be this way. Many people, including the government's Sustainable Development Commission, are saying that it is possible to have prosperity without necessarily having economic growth. And by prosperity they mean living happy, healthy lives. So let us observe the Sabbath for ourselves, for our
