What Do We Worship?

The Bible constantly warns us about the great dangers of worshipping idols and false gods. It is surely significant that in the first two commandments God says, "You shall have no other gods before me" and "You shall not make for yourself an idol".

We may well feel that this is not a huge problem for us – you'd never catch us bowing down to a statue of a god or worshipping things that are not truly worthy of our worship. But the danger of idolatry lies in its subtlety. If our idols were more obvious they would be much easier to avoid, but we are easily deceived by the less direct forms of idolatry:

- when we are more interested in the things that God gives us than in the God who gives them, we are in danger of idolatry; loving the gifts more than the giver.

- when we ascribe a successful harvest to 'mother nature' rather than to our heavenly Father, we are in danger of idolatry.

- when we pay attention to horoscopes, fortune telling, tarot cards and other forms of superstition, we are in danger of idolatry.

- when we act as if all religions are equally valid or speak of them as different paths up the same mountain, we are in danger of idolatry (as well as breaking the first commandment).



- when we refuse to accept the God who is revealed in the pages of scripture, and worship a god who we are more comfortable with or who fits in better with our contemporary culture, then we are already committing idolatry (and breaking the second commandment).

One of the reasons that we are warned so often about idolatry is that ultimately we will become like whatever it is that we worship. Psalm 115 gives a graphic portrayal of how useless and powerless idols are, before delivering the killer blow: "Those who make them will be like them, and so will all who trust in them" (Psalm 115v8). So we must be careful what we give our hearts to and put our trust in, because we will all become like our idols.

The good news is that those who worship the Lord Jesus Christ will find that day by day we become more like him. In other words, we will become the people who God created us to be in the first place.

This should spur us on to follow the example of the Christians in Thessalonica who "turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God, and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead – Jesus, who rescues us from the coming wrath" (1 Thessalonians 1v9-10).

As far as I know, no peregrines nest on Exeter Cathedral or any of the Exe Valley churches but St. Michael's Mount, Dinham in Exeter was actually the first English church on which peregrines nested. The Heritage Lottery Fund has recently funded a webcam which is trained on the nest in the spire during the nesting season.

NATURE NOTES

t has been a good summer and I have a memory of wandering far afield, in cooling breezes and under sunny skies. I have walked by fields of ripening wheat, barley and rape with the latter already too tall to see over and the cereals so densely planted that they could hardly move. Fittingly, in a year when the Great War is being especially remembered, I saw extraordinary fields of poppies, which were so dominant that you could see them miles away.

At that distance these fields tend to take on a brownish hue rather than red. As I looked at them, I wondered what great turmoil caused their birth and growth. Apparently, and surprisingly, the element in the disturbance that causes them to break their dormancy, is exposure to light. The various annual seeds I bring on every year live a life of luxury by comparison and do not fare as well, so I have threatened them with the 'poppy treatment' if they don't buck up next year.

Another companion along the trails I've walked has been Hooweed and this has towered over me, making my head and face gritty with pollen and dust. I suppose we take this and other members of the carrot family for granted, and we indiscriminately call them Meadowsweet or Cow Parsley depending on family tradition and past comments from parents. They brighten our hedgerows and meadows for a considerable period and some in this family have edible leaves that can be used in salads. However, this shouldn't be encouraged as one member of the family is Hemlock, so there is a risk of following in the steps of Socrates. Not that he made a mistake when made to drink the poison, and even though his followers were in tears, he seemed to be quite philosophical about it.

After such a wonderful Summer and glowing Autumn we need not forage for the more obscure edibles in our countryside, as good harvests are predicted everywhere. Indeed there were so many flowers on the brambles, that the noise from the bees has made me wary on several occasions. The various fruits of the forest now cluster and gleam from their tree or hedgerow setting, like some medieval jewellery, and in such embarrassing abundance that no-one or no-thing seems in a rush to pick them.

"to bring all ... unto that agreement in the faith and knowledge of God, and to the ripeness and perfectness of age in Christ, that there be no place left among you, either for error in religion, or for viciousness of life". This is the call to correct and teach people using the bible, in sermons and small groups, lent-courses, etc., so that we all grow into the unity of like belief, love and behaviour.

- "to pray earnestly for his Holy Spirit" and to do my work by teaching only what can be "taken out of the holy scriptures". Not to give opinions on political events, or to teach church tradition, but to explain passages of scripture week by week.
- To be "studious ... in reading and learning the Scriptures, and in framing the manners both of yourselves, and of them that specially pertain unto you, according to the rule of the scriptures". Making sure that I am studying the bible and conforming to it in my life and that my family are too,
- "by daily reading and weighing of the Scriptures, ye may wax riper and stronger in your ministry". The call to personal bible study.

This is my calling: to prayer and to the word. Not primarily to a sacramental ministry. Not to running services for the sake of it but making sure the people of our parishes hear the gospel, making sure that those who repent and believe grow in the knowledge of God and to do all that by teaching the bible. You can decide whether I've been faithful to my calling! Personally I have found it a privilege to perform these tasks.

I am very thankful for time I have had with Steve and John. Their support has been invaluable and a great blessing. To work with colleagues who share Jesus' vision for ministry, lead to a

happy and harmonious staff team and a real sense of partnership in the gospel.

Another joy was seeing people come to appreciate bible teaching and desire to know Christ in his word. To see the "lights turn on" so to speak, as some people for the first time began to know that God was speaking to them as his word was taught, was a huge delight and the great privilege of my ministry.

Over my third year here, I became increasingly thankful for the weekly presence of EVC. It was a great blessing to be able to go to a congregation where all the people wanted to meet to hear God's word, sing his praise and get to know each other, because they loved to do so. Love is never better experienced than by two people who know they are helpless sinners saved by the faith in the cross of Christ. For when people are brought together through the cross, pretence is stifled, honesty grows, forgiveness rules, kindness flows, and joy increases as we find ourselves loving the same Lord and delighting in the same word. I am thankful to those who attend and pray that you go from strength to strength.

For me, as for many, a particular highlight has been the yearly holiday club. It was great to work with all the volunteers who make it happen and to feel that we really were presenting the gospel to those who have never heard it, or responded to it. Further, I treasure the memories of being part of a team which found its identity in proclaiming the scriptures, beyond giving the kids a great time (which I am delighted to say they always had!)

Finally, can I say "thank you" to all those people who have showed us real
