We're pretty sure that in a couple of weeks our carefully chosen gift will be donated to Oxfam or sold on eBay. And it hurts to know that our gift was not wanted.

On the very first Christmas, God gave the world an extraordinary gift. He loved this broken and fallen world enough to give us his only Son, so that we can know his mercy and grace. The angels announced the good news of peace with God and goodwill towards men. But despite God's amazing generosity, his greatest gift to the world was not wanted.

The Lord Jesus was turned away from the inn and he was hunted by Herod. Later, he was mocked and rejected. He was branded a madman or a demon. In fact, those who follow the real Jesus find that the world often treats them in much the same way as it treated him. We don't like to be reminded of the gift that we rejected. But the Bible teaches us that God will treat us exactly as we treat the Lord Jesus Christ. If we reject God's greatest gift and follow a fake instead, then we will find ourselves rejected. We can never know peace with God, if we turn our backs on the one true Prince of Peace.

The good news of Christmas is that if we will accept God's greatest gift, the real Jesus who we only meet in the pages of scripture, then God promises that he will accept us. No matter who we are or what we have done, if we receive Jesus, then God will receive us. If we welcome Jesus into our lives, then God will welcome us. If we follow Jesus, then God's love will follow us. This amazing gift is still given to all who accept the real Jesus.

So what will we do with God's greatest gift to the world this Christmas?

ALL CHANGE

By now, most of you will have heard the news that Sarah and I will shortly be leaving the Exe Valley in order for me to take up a new post in North Devon. We feel a mixture of sadness and excitement at the prospect of all the changes that the next few months will bring. We will miss our good friends in the Exe Valley, but we do feel the time is right for a new start.

Before I moved to Mid-Devon, a friend said to me that he thought I was taking on impossible task by becoming an incumbent of nine parishes. I've often felt that he might have been right! I have no doubt that I have made many mistakes and that I have simply not been able to satisfy all the different hopes and expectations of the nine parishes. However, I have felt for some time that there is also a deeper problem, namely that the kind of ministry that I feel called to offer, is not the kind of ministry that the parishes wish to receive.

When I accepted the position of Rector of the Exe Valley Mission Community, I made it clear that I did so on the understanding that the nine parishes were open to change. Over the four years that I have been in the post, it has become increasingly clear that this is not generally the case. I have often been saddened and surprised at how averse to change our parishes can be, and how personally hostile people can be towards those who suggest change.

Most of us find change difficult, to a lesser or greater degree, but resistance to change can also be a reflection of a misplaced faith. Instead of putting our faith in a God who never changes, we put our faith in a church that we hope will never change, and we are consequently deeply threatened by the thought that it might change. This is highly unfortunate, as change is absolutely essential, if churches are to prosper and grow.

I would like to say a very big 'thank you' to all those who have supported me in the



changes that I have tried to make. Your love and kindness have made an immense difference in some challenging times, and I will leave with many happy memories of the fellowship that we shared. I am especially grateful to those who have been willing to embrace change even when they have found it difficult and costly to do so.

One of my own favourite verses in the bible is Hebrews 13v8: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever". It's wonderful to know that in the Lord Jesus Christ we find a solid rock on which we can anchor our lives and our eternal destinies. True security only ever comes from putting our faith in the right place: not in an unchanging church, but in an unchanging God. May we learn to trust him more deeply in the many changes that the next few months will bring to our mission community.

NATURE NOTES

Winter sleeps – nature creeps. In fact nature protects itself from Winter by hiding from it, and we are warned by the climate change specialists to expect wild swings in our weather even during a single season. However, whenever I think of Winter I always think of stillness, frosty mornings, the silence of snow in a land asleep and a survival challenge for many animals.

It is amazing to remember the feverish activity in our garden of only two months ago. When one bent to a gardening task the ground would be teeming with the movement of small creatures - spiders, wood mice, frogs, slow worms, slugs, worms, beetles. All are seemingly intent on their immediate business or preparation for winter and ignoring my presence. Of these the slow worms are the most handsome and as they are relatively common in the South West many will be aware of how quickly they wriggle away when not basking in warm spots. They are legless lizards and though their common name is a misnomer in terms of speed of movement, they are indeed leisurely in clearing slugs from our garden.

As we approach the depths of winter, all goes quiet although the pheasants do tend to return and settle nearer the house, garden and in the lane. This is readily
