SHOULD JUDAS HAVE BEEN FORGIVEN ?

Recently a member of one of our congregations showed me an article claiming that Judas Iscariot has had a "Bad Press". Surely, it asked, if Peter was forgiven by our Lord shouldn't Judas have been? A Clergyperson and a diocesan Bishop are quoted in support of this idea. This article, based upon a document known as "The Gospel of Judas", made me consider again the whole matter of forgiveness.

The so called "Gospel of Judas" was written about 250 AD and never circulated widely. Similar apocryphal Gospels are the basis for Dan Brown's novel "The Da Vinci Code".

The article shows a very common misunderstanding of what forgiveness is. God is a Holy God. He is "of purer eyes than to behold evil, and cannot look upon iniquity". Forgiveness is a very costly matter; it is far more than just "overlooking" wrong. God never says sin does not matter if He did, He would have no basis for judgement and no reason to condemn a Hitler.

The article goes on to suggest that Jesus forgave those who were crucifying Him so why not Judas? However, in fact, Jesus did not forgive those who crucified Him.

He prayed for them to be forgiven which is quite different - that is in line with His teaching, to pray for our enemies and would have required their repentance for the prayer to be answered.



Throughout the Bible, God's forgiveness is shown to be very costly, dependent upon repentance on the part of the sinner, and then only on the basis of sacrifice. In the Old seen Testament this was symbolically in the sacrificial within Temple svstem the worship.

Under the New Covenant, instituted by Jesus, we know that it is the even more costly sacrifice of Jesus upon the cross, that enables a repentant sinner to approach God and receive His forgiveness. The Apostle Peter makes the extraordinary statement that "God made Jesus to be sin, who knew no sin, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him".

Yes, the Gospel proclaims that forgiveness is free, but it is not without cost - the cost of the sacrifice of God's own Son upon the cross. The freedom is available to us, only because the cost has been paid by none other than the Son of God!

Such is the love of God!

As far as Judas is concerned, we must not confuse feeling guilty with repentance. Guilt may well lead to repentance and gloriously often does - but not always and it is quite possible to die in our guilt without being forgiven.

After Peter's denial he "went out and wept bitterly". He knew his guilt but was truly repentant.

There is no record of Judas repenting - only feeling sorry for himself and committing suicide.

That is not repentance so, sadly, he died unforgiven, and like all unrepentant sinners, must now face the judgement of a Holy God.

AT THE CROSSROADS

We've tried to confront radical Islam with imperialism and F-16s, and now it's time to give Jesus a try. Christianity in the Middle East is not dying - it is radically changing"

"In that day there will be a highway from Egypt to Assyria ... Israel will be the third with Egypt and Assyria, a blessing in the midst of the earth, whom the Lord of hosts has blessed, saying, "Blessed be Egypt my people, and Assyria the work of my hands, and Israel my inheritance." (Isaiah 19:23-25)

We have just received this exciting report of 'At the Crossroads' - a gathering at Christ Church, Jerusalem, of some two hundred Middle Eastern believers from radically different backgrounds. United by a common love for the Lord Jesus, they are demonstrating that love in remarkable ways.

Inspired by Isaiah's vision that the Middle East will be a blessing, Muslimbackground followers of Jesus from various Middle Eastern countries met with their Christian and Messianic Jewish counterparts to worship, pray and strategise how to help their wartorn region. They met 21-23 March in Jerusalem's Old City at Christ Church, the oldest Protestant (Anglican) Church in the Middle East. Nearly 200 delegates came from Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Israel, Iraq, the Palestinian Authority, Cyprus, Armenia, Georgia, Turkey, Iran and Kenya. Attendees worshipped and prayed together in Arabic, Turkish, Kurdish, Hebrew and heard testimonies about the blessings and challenges of following Jesus in this region.

Christian workers from Cyprus, Turkey, Iraq, Lebanon and Jordan shared how they have been caring for some of the millions of refugees streaming out of war-torn Syria and Iraq. "God uses ordinary people to do extraordinary things," said Pastors from Cyprus. Their small church hosted 56 Muslim refugees for seven months, rescued from a sinking fishing boat.

"We did everything wrong culturally, not being Muslims ourselves," said a Pastor from northern Iraq. Still, God has blessed his work by restoring hope in the camps housing Muslim refugees from Mosul. Numerous refugees are responding to this message of hope by asking to be baptised and joining newly established churches.

Several speakers stressed that while the traditional churches are in decline, due to war and extremism, there are new Christian communities forming, consisting of Yazidis, Alawites, Turks, Kurds, Sunnis and Shi'ites. In the words of one of the organisers, "Christianity in the Middle East is not dying - it is radically changing."

Tuesday morning, Rev. David Pileggi, Rector of Christ Church Anglican Jerusalem, announced the terrorist

NATURE NOTES

Trees, like children, should only be briefly staked during the early stage of their life. They have every intention of growing straight, upright and true.

If a tree leans and its foliage is blighted down one side it is very probable that there is a problem with the associated roots. I am indebted to a tree surgeon for this diagnosis and it demonstrates the limits of observation alone.

I think I presumed there was an airborne problem or the tree could overcome root deficiencies by better distributing its total supply of food and water. The human analogy is again not



far to find, but the point I wish to make concerns the art of observing Nature. The work of Tristan Gooley is particularly interesting in this context. In his books he demonstrates how Nature can be used as an aid to navigation or [eg. "Red sky at night"] how old sayings contain an element of truth For example no tree is symmetrical and its shape will be determined by the prevailing wind [from the south west in Britain] and the promotion of growth on the southerly side.

Similarly, if you have not seen stinging nettles for a while whilst walking but they start to appear, it is very likely that you are nearing a place of previous or current habitation. [nettles favour ground that has been disturbed or cultivated – so children are right when they complain that nettles seem to follow them around]

All this must come as no surprise to farmers and landowners as their very livelihood depends on their observation of Nature. Any change in the environment is observed, and the possible consequence for their crops and livestock evaluated. They too, like the previous example quoted, can make me feel like Dr. Watson, in that I obviously "look but do not see"

However I do know that when the sun aligns with the two outhouses in the garden it is four o'clock. Time enough for a cup of tea and to observe the world around more carefully and patiently.
