t is the little things in life that cause the most bother. Something inconsequential and tinv can take on а disproportionate significance!

Take the other day. There I was, hard at work, beavering away. when I suddenly fancied a cuppa. But while waiting for the kettle to boil, I did something, a tiny weeny something, a something that I didn't have to do, and wouldn't normally do, but I did something which would have consequences for the rest of the day.

And here's what I did. I opened a cupboard door and started to tidy things up. I didn't need to. I didn't have to. I was just passing the time, while the kettle boiled. I picked up all sorts of half empty packets, the tail end, fag end dregs of suppers passed, and started to put them together. And then – and here's where it all went wrong - I picked up two opened packets of couscous!

Oh! If only I'd known! Oh! If only I had left them on the shelf! But no! I picked them up, and realising that there was too much to put in one packet, I poured the couscous into an empty jar. Of course, there was far too much to squeeze in, and because, by now the kettle had

boiled, and I really hadn't intended to sort out the cupboards. 1 chucked the superfluous couscous into the sink, before running the hot tap to swill it down the drain.

Running the hot tap! Running the hot tap! What was I thinking of? Running the hot tap! What a stupid, foolish, idiotic thing to do. Before I could utter the word. 'Tabbouleh', both sinks had blocked, with water attempting to gush onto the kitchen floor.

STEPH REFL**EXE**

've just undertaken my last duty as Mayor's Chaplain at the Mayor Choosing ceremony. I've been doing it now for two years, and it has been fascinating to get a glimpse into some of the goings-on. There's a strange little ritual where the outgoing mayor processes out of the Council Chamber (followed by his chaplain) into an ante room, and then there is a quick change of clothes and the new mayor processes in. All of which is vaguely reminiscent of a French farce – except in this scenario everyone definitely keeps their trousers on! At the time of writing, things were up in the air in France, but now the election result is known. and a new regime has taken control. while others no doubt reflect and regroup, planning for the future. By the time you read this, we will have had our own election, and we will know the winners and the losers.

Winning and losing. Victory and defeat. Such a lot of energy, words and hot air spent on gaining power and destroying the opposition, for such a comparatively short amount of time. It's so easy to cut down and destroy: it's much more difficult to build up and encourage.

The Bible has some things to say about such things. 'So, let's agree to use all our energy in getting along with each other. Help others with encouraging words; don't drag them down by finding fault.' (Romans 14: 19 MSG) Whoever is elected, let's hope that they have the wisdom to think long-term, to build something good and the restraint not to knock down. And I hope, in my own small way, I do too.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

'TODAY' 50 years ago June and July, 1967

ow times have changed! One of The concerns being raised in mid-1967 was the effects of the terms of our entry into the Common Market (Brenter?)! But one particular article that jumped out at me from the June magazine, and set me thinking, was the following, with its oh-soprophetic concluding comment:

"It often happens that we don't realise how full of interest something is, until we are in danger of losing it; perhaps an old cottage that is to be demolished for road widening, a particular tree, or a piece of wormeaten furniture. If we enter the Common Market, lots of 'English' things will have to go - like our system of weights and measures. 'The decimal system is much easier'; I can't think why we do measure in such an odd way". These are snatches of conversation which, today, can be heard anywhere. But although apparently unrelated and certainly difficult to remember, our peculiar weights and measures are the embodiment of sound method. It is as well to know what a thing is worth before putting it in the dustbin.

The human body itself obviously provided the most convenient way of measuring - first the foot, then the hand. And if anything really small had to be measured, there was the thumb (from the Scandinavian 'tumme'). It so happens that twelve thumbs make up a foot (and it is easy to picture ancient man marking out something with his grubby thumb). The word 'inch' simply means a twelfth. Twelve

thumbs (inches) equals one foot. An Ell was the distance from elbow to fingertip; and the yard (from the Middle English 'yerde', a stick) was the length of Henry 1's arm. "The Stick (yerde) that is used for measuring woollen cloth," said the king, "is to be the length of my arm". It was three feet (i.e. thirty-six thumbs) - three feet, one yard. With arms fully extended, the extreme stretch of a man from fingertip to fingertip is six feet. This is an 'embrace' or 'fathom', a unit of measure used especially by sailors. (Again, it takes little imagination to see how they first dropped the lead over the side until it touched the bottom, then counted how many full stretches of line they pulled in; one embrace or fathom equals six feet).

Two hundred and twenty yards was thought to be the distance a team of oxen should pull a plough without stopping. This became a furrow long; that is, a furlong. The rod, pole or perch which the ploughman used to goad the leading oxen had to be very long - long enough to reach from behind the plough, $5\frac{1}{2}$ yards long. How convenient when reckoning a man's wages for the ploughing he had done, to measure with the rod. An average day's work was reckoned at four rods. Take, therefore, four rods and place them end to end in a chain (22 yards) across the furlong (220 yards), and the amount of land a man was expected to plough in a day would be 4,840 square yards, i.e. an acre.

Each community had its own weightstone which was kept in the Market House. The fact that such stones varied in weight from town to town was unimportant while trading was

simply local. And, even today, the stone can vary according to the kind of merchandise. (A stone of wool is 24 lbs, of hay - 22 lbs, and of cheese -16 lbs). Men who traded in the East were known as 'Easterlings', a word which was corrupted to 'Sterling', and used specially by a league of reliable merchants, who had their headquarters in London.

The English silver penny - our oldest coin, was also known as an Easterling. The quantity of precious metal it contained was fixed by law -921/2% silver, 71/2% copper), and could everywhere be handled with confidence. Thus 'Sterling' as applied to English merchants and English coinage came to mean 'genuine' or 'valuable'.

Over the ages, people of many nations have flocked here for their own benefit, and to the enrichment of our language and customs - Romans, Germans, Danes, French and Dutch, so don't let us be too reluctant to surrender anything we took originally from them. But are we joining Europe? Is it perhaps that Europe will continue to be joining us? W.H.A."

The (then) editor added the following note, "If we had been taught this sort of thing at school, none of us would have found it difficult to remember weights and measures. I was particularly interested in the thumb measure - from which, presumably, we get our 'rule of thumb' - a rough and ready guide."

NATURE NOTES

could be more relaxed about Brexit if I knew that our negotiators had experience of working with Nature. Nature teaches the need for patience, the benefit of knowledge and application but, as a complete anathema to politicians, the importance of the long term and admitting that things may be beyond your control. As we work through a parched Spring, readying the garden for Summer, the repeated thought in my head has been "Nature provides but Man contrives".

As a humble gardener I cannot imagine being a farmer whose livelihood depends the on performance of their crops. I debated day by day when to recharge my wild flower meadow using seeds from a company carrying the seal of approval from the Prince of Wales! It is said that arable farmers in East Anglia, in the age before intense mechanisation, used to lower their trousers on the 'bare' ground, to make the decision of when to sow. Parishioners and neighbours will be relieved to know that I did not adopt this method.

Then there were the late frosts - so what hope for our careful planning. The most fascinating response was from the leaves of some beeches, which were already tardy by any measure. Their cigar casing became a warped pupal case, only for the emerge leaves to just spectacularly as a dazed butterfly.

Whilst appreciating how resilient Nature can be, I wonder how many appreciate the fragility. It is beyond most of us to appreciate how global warming threatens the environment of many species. The nearest I come to this fragility is the pricking out of seedlings. It is a matter of wonder as I gouge out a single foxglove, quite a brute of a plant if you consider it, and clumsily hold the seed leaves whilst the impossibly long tendril of a dangling thin root, trembles below. My hand shakes as I transfer something weaker than a new born baby and try to stuff it into a new hole and make it stand up. But stand up and flourish it does, leaving you in wonder to how as Nature accomplishes this without all this rigmarole. It has long been known that custodians of the land and Nature only contribute 1% to G.D.P (Gross Domestic Product) – now that is fragile.

The breakfast, between the two Services on Easter Sunday, was again well received and enjoyed, and thanks to all those who contributed Our Church was towards this. prettily decorated, as always, by our floral decorators in the usual Easter theme. 'Thank you' to all of you.

On Sunday, 30 April the Service to celebrate the Feast Day of St Catherine, and 170 years since the opening of our Church, was taken by Steph. It was good to welcome members of the other Churches in our Cluster area and also many

friends from Tiverton and our Parish who attended this special service. Coffee was served after the Service before many joined in the lunch in the Village Hall, again to celebrate this occasion. Thanks to Margaret for decorating the Church and the tables in the Village Hall on the theme of St Also thanks go to Catherine. everyone who helped and contributed in any way in making the lunch so enjoyable.

During the course of the lunch, Margaret explained a little about St Catherine, and the thinking behind the decorations. "St Catherine of Siena died at the age of 33 years on 29 April 1380. She spent all her life, from a very young age, doing good works and leading a life dedicated to God. St Catherine was a writer and the Church gave her the title of 'Doctor' - one of only three women to have been honoured with this title by the Church. In pictures, she is shown with a crown of thorns. Other symbols associated with her are the lily, rose, ring, miniature church or miniature ship. I decided to use white roses and other white flowers in Church - white being the colour to symbolise a Saint and I used Laurel leaves and other greenery to create the pedestal arrangement. I found that Laurel was one of the plants that are associated with St Catherine. In the windows, I put blue bottles to represent the blue of the sea with a single white rose. The green and gold ribbon was tied around the neck of the bottle to represent the green of Spring, the gold to honour the Saint and the ribbons and bows to celebrate the festival. In the Hall I used the same ribbon to carry the theme of the festival across the tables, with Laurel leaves scattered along the ribbon. I used shades of

blue and pink with white Spring flowers from the garden. The serviettes were chosen with the rose and then the blue and pink to match and blend with the flowers to give the Hall the feeling of a festival"

Friday 5 May saw thirty church members gather at the Thelbridge Cross Inn for the Annual PCC (and friends) dinner – a thoroughly enjoyable evening, and thank you, Sara, for organising this once again.

On Sunday 7 May the Bluebell walk, in aid of the Village Hall fund, attracted a good number of participants, some from beyond the Parish, who were rewarded with a stunning display of bluebells. All, as well as those unable to tackle the walk, were treated to an excellent tea in the Village Hall afterwards. Thank you, Duncan and Sara, for organising the walk, to those who provided the tea, and to all who supported the event which raised £261.
