# A THEOLOGICAL THOUGHT FROM TESCO'S !

For some unbeknown reason I found myself in Tesco's the day after Boxing Day. I am pretty sure this was NOT because we needed any sprouts/ prosecco/ olives/ cheesy nibbly things/ tempura battered prawns, (and I can't actually remember why I was there), but I found myself standing in an aisle, in the first aisle in fact, and I came over all peculiar. I felt ever so slightly faint and weak at the knees. Dare I say it, I felt shocked! Yes Had I missed shocked! something? Was I suffering from amnesia? Had the whole Christmas thing become too much?

You see, the thing that shocked me, the thing that pulled me up short, was not the reduced wrapping paper or cards, or the bargain elf jumpers and slippers (tempting though they were), it was the chocolate. Not just any old chocolate. It was the assorted chocolate in various shapes, wrapped in multicoloured paper.

The thing that shocked me was the row upon row upon row of chocolate Easter eggs! Easter eggs! In December! On the shelves! The day after Boxing Day! I left the shop without buying a thing.

A few days later I realized, from reading the press, that other people felt as shocked as I did. That made me feel slightly better.



However, recently, I have been thinking about it once more. I know it's a marketing attempt to get us to buy more stuff in readiness for the next big seasonal event (and I did find myself thinking how handy it would be for me personally if the Harvest Supper season could be spread throughout the year!) but maybe there is a tiny bit of theological sense to it.

You see, for it to make any sense, the Christmas/Easter thing has to go together. They are one story. They are part of the same story. And for the story to have any power or relevance today we cannot

detach Easter from Christmas. And of course that is what we are prone to do. It's far more comfortable and less challenging to go all gooey over the birth of a baby, than to wrestle with the idea of that baby being God's son, dying a violent death and defying death by coming back to life, so that we might have eternal life. It's so much easier to leave the baby in the manger and not think about him again until next year.

So maybe, just maybe, the marketing moguls have stumbled upon something. And maybe we too should give it more than a passing thought, as we travel towards Spring, through the wilderness of Lent, to the joy and exuberance of Easter.

### FROM THE ARCHIVES N

#### **'TODAY' 50 years ago** February and March, 1968

The lead article in the March magazine was headed, "With Regret", and opened with the words, "This has been a bad year.", bearing in mind that this would have been written sometime in February! Foot and Mouth had taken its toll on Autumn and Christmas events, and there was still no date when Youth Club would re-commence. And, for the first time since "The Group" came into being, no Magazine was published for February, (which at least explains why the archive is lacking a copy!).

A new form of Service for Holy Communion was to be introduced at Stoodleigh on Maundy Thursday, and members of the various PCCs were encouraged to attend. It was acknowledged that change might not always be welcome!

The long range weather forecast for the four weeks ahead was 'very cold'.

The fact that people, in general, were walking less, even though they might be involved in strenuous physical work, was cited as the reason so many were now suffering from bad backs.

Loxbeare had held a very successful Children's Service on Christmas Eve.

Marmalade at 1/6 a jar (7½p) was being offered for sale by Mrs Tull in aid of Templeton Church tower, and orders were being taken.

Withleigh Young Farmers had now reconvened with the end of the Foot and Mouth problems.



The songbirds were back in a profusion of glowing colours throughout December, giving little thought to the RSPB planned 'big garden birdwatch'. Given their absence from our feeding station in Autumn it must have been a good harvest for them.

I do not know how we would manage to break the gloom of winter without the bright glimpses of holly and these vibrant visitors. Might I suggest that you also raise your spirits by considering ferns. Granted they are not the most exciting of things, and you have to wonder why they were so fashionable for the Victorians, to such an extent that they had a word – pteridomania – for it.

A visit to Britain 300million years ago would bring more admiration for ferns that were then 100ft high. They are now the coal deposits of today. My Countryside in Britain book advises me that our tallest fern [bracken] can be 6ft high and I find this an exaggeration. Nevertheless size is not everything, and in our pleasant land the green comfort and intricacy of these flowerless plants provide for gentle contemplation. There are around 50 species in the British Isles so I would recommend choosing one as a screen-saver view for each week of the vear. Of course in the west of the country, and particularly in Devon, we are not short of the real thing. I would mention the small Polypody fern which grows out of rocks and from the branches of trees [mostly oak in my experience]. This is totally absent from the east of England and one wonders how many visitors spot such a feature and remark on it.

Ferns are primarily woodland plants and I associate them mostly with wet and

sheltered spots. The gloss of Hart's Tongue demands attention in winter, all ferns welcome you to the cool of a wood in summer, whilst in Devon lanes during Spring they almost go through a metamorphosis. When other plants are starting to burst forth, the ferns - after sailing through winter - go into decline. Ferns propagate via spores and/or rhizome and the exotic coiled spring of new growth emerges like an alien species - however the ferns probably think that we are the late-comers to their planet.
