FROM THE ARCHIVES

'TODAY' 50 years ago June / July, 1970

The main topic in the June issue was that Rev. Ron Herniman, our Group Rector, and his wife, Grace, would be leaving us in the Autumn, when he would be taking on the role of Archdeacon of Barnstaple. The announcement was made with a sense of sadness at leaving the Exe Valley. Parish notes mixed congratulations with a similar sense of sadness.

The July lead article questioned who was ruling our country – Parliament, or the Trade Unions.

Plans were well advanced for reviving the work of the Women's Royal Voluntary Service in the parishes of our Group. One of the biggest tasks undertaken by the WRVS was the meals-on-wheels service.

By an amazing coincidence, fifty years ago, the magazine carried the announcement that Holidays at Home (forerunner of Holiday club) would not take place – in its usual form, not due to a pandemic, but due to the person who normally led the event being unavailable. Special camps and outings were being arranged, however, but only a relative few would be able to take part. It was hoped to return to normal in 1971.

The Oakford Girl Guides had been busy with, amongst other things, a day's ramble on Exmoor, a Diamond Anniversary Service in the Cathedral, and a County Guide day at Powderham Castle.

Rackenford's 'church sheep' sale had raised £80 for the fabric fund. An outing was being arranged for members of the choir and Sunday School.

Stoodleigh were concerned about the extra traffic on the roads as a result of the Beeching cuts, the deteriorating condition of the local roads, and an increasing number of incidents. The future of School Cottages had, once again, become an issue.

The sale of Stoodleigh 'church sheep' [Not the congregation!] had raised £170.

At Templeton, a certain family by the name of Coffin had moved into Colson Barton. The July magazine focussed on the village of Templeton – in Pembrokeshire, following a visit there by the Tulls.

Washfield had raised the sum of \pounds 147 through the sale of 'church sheep' which had been pastured by farmers within the parish.

At Withleigh, an outing was also being arranged for members of the choir and Sunday School.

NATURE NOTES

The most amazing thing about the crisis is that we should be surprised. If we continue with environmental destruction, { loss of habitat and deforestation; loss of species; polluting and using up resources} should it be a mystery what pathogens do when their natural niches have disappeared and we are the main living being that dominates a crowded mainly urban scene? Some years ago I discovered mayfly nymphs for the first time. I was shoring up the banks of a stream to prevent erosion and they were stuck to the rocks taken from the bed of the water course. Despite being barely a few millimetres long and seemingly having three tails they were quite fearsome when studied in more detail {though I missed seeing their external gills which they apparently have} and in their waterlogged state it was hard to imagine the metamorphosis to come.

As if the miracle of creation and birth is not enough, we have animals which at the flick of a switch transform from a watery existence to a life not just on land but in the air! It is impossible to imagine how this would feel but at least the young are spared the embarrassment of cooing relatives gathered around and debating which parent the offspring most resembles. It is incredibly restful to watch a mayfly in flight [not only in May!] and they hang somewhat aimlessly in the air with their bodies' vertical drifting like a stringless kite.

The excitement of kite flying is better captured by the dragonfly which has a similar {but still short} lifecycle and whose appearance never ceases to leave the observer with awe rather than a reminder of the briefness of life. I present these examples because despite being fragile creatures and beset by perils and predators for virtually every minute of their existence, they have been around for millions of years. The pandemic has brought out the best in our selfless nature but we will need a metamorphosis to find a sustainable future somewhere over the rainbow.

In the fifteen months since Jenny's Mum died we have been truly blessed. With hardly a hitch we sold her house and contents, swiftly followed by selling Keepers Cottage and putting our belongings into store. Well, that all sounds straightforward ... but, as they always say on the best Detective Serials.

Previously ...

After searching several areas of England and Wales, we decided to buy a new-build property in Lydney, Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire – with a completion date of 31 July 2020 !! With this in mind we decided to rent through a Letting Agent, for six months or so – and part of our storage was to be delivered to our "Rental".

The first property we signed up for was near Glastonbury but on our third visit we finally met the owner, who told us that she could only have us there for 31 days because she was licenced as a "Holiday Let" and not a "Long Let". Really ?? This was at a few days notice so Jenny spent all night searching for an alternative – and found a very suitable property in Cheltenham. The owners were going to travel abroad for six months and wanted someone to look after their home. Perfect for us and them but you can see where this is going !! Unknowingly, we filled in the necessary forms on-line and continued packing. Sorted !!

The last three days were a bit tricky. Thankfully, Geoff's son Damien came to help and we had no end of help from Wottons but Jenny still only had five hours sleep in thirty-six hours. It was arranged for the furniture to go into store the day before the actual move so that we could finish tidying and cleaning on the last morning. We asked Liz and Roger if we could have B & B, as we would have no bed or kettle !! They very kindly offered this as a parting gift and Geoff walked down there at bedtime and Damien decided to sleep in his Camper on our drive. I carried on packing and about 5am I drove down to catch a couple of hours. Wottons were due back at Keepers Cottage at 7am so we had to be there early but Liz and Roger were insistant that we must come back at 9am for breakfast. Imagine our surprise when we opened their kitchen door at 9.03am to find all our closest friends gathered to share breakfast together. What an emotional moment. It was hard to tear ourselves away. The remainder of the morning went to plan with us finally driving away on the dot of 1pm – which was the arranged handover time.

We've missed out a bit !! The Cheltenham let was not going to be available until 1 April so we were planning to visit it on the way down to Tenby, to stay for nearly three weeks with Jenny's Aunt. We booked a room in the Travelodge on M48 and set off for Cheltenham to meet the Letting Agent and view the Rental property. We were near the Nailsea junction when the mobile rang. The owners had decided that due to the Coronavirus it looked unlikely that they would be able to travel - so they were staying at home !! The timing of that call was perfect because we decided to go straight to the Travelodge and SLEEP !! Next day we went to Tenby ... and we're still here. We are so blessed. Jenny's Aunt says that we can stay here until our house is ready – which could be Christmas because no work has been done on it since the Lockdown. We get regular deliveries from the local Farm Shop, General Grocer and Butcher – in addition to Jenny's cousin who also shops for us. Jenny has rediscovered cooking !!

Geoff has painted the shed and repaired and painted a wooden "Bill" or "Ben" and is now painting the fence. Jenny has been busy in the garden with Joyce when she isn't ordering replacements for all the things we put in "Rental" storage – even buying a basic sewing machine to be able to do alterations and make new clothes. No change there then !!

It is a surreal time and things must be so difficult for you all the the Exe Valley. All the annual events planned and enjoyed by so many, will have had to be cancelled. No-one could ever have imagined that a virus could bring the world to its knees. The coming days and months will tell whether we are actually getting the better of it but one feels that things will never quite be the same again. We are content here with our happy memories of Washfield and our dreams for the future. Thank you all for your friendship.

Sadly we say goodbye to:

Major George Llewellyn MC Our condolences are offered to the family and friends of Arthur David George Llewellyn who died on 26 March, aged 97. He was a soldier, a farmer, a stockbroker, a cabinet maker and a photographer.

Major Llewellyn was born in South Devon and brought up at Nethway House, Kingswear, Dartmouth. Following an education at Eton and Sandhurst he joined the Scots Guards in 1941. He was awarded the Military Cross for his part in the Hechtel action, where he was taken prisoner. He had insisted on being left behind as he was too weak to move and did not want to impede the withdrawal of his platoon.

In 1950 he married Loveday Bolitho at Rosel Manor in Jersey and then returned to South Devon four years later where he set up a business making clotted cream. In the early 1960s a new career began as a stockbroker, joining Grievson Grant in London, and then moving to become a partner in Hoare Govett.

Major Llewellyn, Loveday and their four children moved to Stuckeridge House, Oakford in 1968. Here they farmed and made an exceptional garden. Bicycling, fishing and rough shooting were pastimes he loved.

He served as High Sheriff in 1982/3, held office as chairman of the River Exe Association, became а regional committee member of the National Trust and chairman of the local Marie Curie committee. He also became a director of The Moulton Bicycle Company and twice cycled across France. He was in his eighties on the second trip and raised £100,000 for Sightsavers.

Being an accomplished cabinet maker and photographer, he spent many happy hours in his studio producing some beautiful pieces of furniture, and in his dark room developing photographs.

George spent his later years at Nethercott when his son, Henry, took over the management of the Stuckeridge estate. He was often seen driving through the village and was a generous supporter of village events and St Peter's. He sometimes took part and was a regular attender at the annual Service of Remembrance. He will be greatly missed.

George's wife, Loveday, predeceased him in 2007. He is survived by his son and three daughters, 11 grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren.
