FROM THE ARCHIVES

'TODAY' 50 years ago

February / March, 1971

he official forming of the Exe Valley Group was being delayed by two trusts which hold the Right of Patronage, and who, having seemingly showed no interest in their respective parishes, were now seeking to impose their own style of churchmanship on the Group. Our Rector was staying put until this matter had been resolved!

The March lead article focussed on 'reward and punishment', criticising the unions who demanded bonuses or rewards when production was above par, but refusing to consider penalties when the reverse happened.

M.H.A. predicted that, "in 50 years or less, the Post Office as we know it will have disappeared"! It was envisaged that communication would generally be by telephone and the like.

On the 15th February, life changed forever, with D-Day – Decimalisation!

'Criss-cross-quiz' matches were about to begin.

A concert given by members of the Oakford W.I. had been greatly appreciated. Over the course of three nights of carol singing, the Girl Guides had raised £13.14.5d for Save the Children Fund.

The parents of a child recently baptised at Rackenford had made a donation for the purchase of two new prayer books. It was suggested that others might be encouraged to follow suit.

Rackenford's first church register, covering births, deaths and marriages from 1561 to about 1700, had been temporarily returned to the parish. It was hoped that, one day, a permanent transcript could be held in the parish.

'Galloping inflation' had resulted in the Stoodleigh PCC deciding to proceed immediately with the installation of a new heating system, at a cost of £1,500.

Templeton's notes for the January magazine had gone AWOL. The Christmas Favre had raised about £60, and the carol singers had raised £10. Plans for the new village hall were awaiting approval by the Council.

Two Withleigh families had had their photos in the Gazette, the Yekas through the making of a roomful of paper flowers, and the Britton brothers for reviving the old skill of the wheelwright. The collection of old newspapers and magazines to raise money for the church was being organised.

NATURE NOTES

t seems to be a very quiet time of year for everything. The deer and pheasants are not making much of an appearance and the nightly comforting calls of owls are a reminder of nature in hiding for the present.

The trees keep silent watch and their lack of leaves further deaden the landscape of movement unless they choose to fall over.

The land has been so soaked and heavy underfoot it is not surprising that there have been some close calls near sloping woodland.

It has been a sobering winter when we have rejoined the animal kingdom and shared a life reduced to keeping safe and hunting for food. We have always been one step of any advice, so that for some time now we have departed in starlight to forage the supermarket shelves. I am afraid this has disturbed the birds of the hedgerow and they accompany us home along the lane like the outriders in a police escort. Thanks to the mild weather and soft ground the wrens and blackbirds have been active around the house all winter and as they don't venture far this bodes well for the future.

However we cannot rival a recent sight at Knightshayes. About 20 blackbirds were looking for food and tossing leaves under trees in a manner so typical of them. The countryside around Templeton is beautiful. The footpaths, bridleways and byways in our parish have been so important, particularly over the last year. It is vital that we maintain and create walking routes so that the countryside and our towns and cities may be explored on foot.

Over 49,000 miles of historic paths enough to stretch around the world nearly twice - are missing from the official maps in England and Wales. More than a fifth of the lost paths are in the South West of England (over 9,000 miles) with Devon topping the list of

counties with the most rights of way missing. These paths are a vital part of our heritage, yet if they are not reclaimed for inclusion on the definitive map (the legal record of rights of way) by January 2026, we risk losing them forever, as after this time, it will no longer be possible to add paths to the definitive map based on historic evidence.

Devon County Council has been carrying out a definitive map review of the public rights of way in the parishes across the whole of Devon, and Templeton parish is now their main focus. You will soon see posters and information on our notice boards, and circulated through email, about ways that we can have our say about our local footpaths, and who to contact.
