FROM THE ARCHIVES

'TODAY' 50 years ago

April, 1971

(Notes from March 1971 were included in the last issue).

The April lead article focussed on resistance to change within the church, the 'old guard' being unwilling to accept the need to move forward, effectively stifling the gospel.

Calverleigh was arranging practices for maypole dancing.

The Oakford Guides had spent a weekend at the Devon Guide Cottage on Dartmoor during March, with heavy snow on the Sunday. There was some disappointment that the minibus managed to get through to collect them!

Plans were in hand to form a Brownie Pack in Rackenford.

There was much turmoil in Stoodleigh over the proposal to provide mains sewage, and the potential cost to properties if the take-up of those being connected was low.

Teams from both Templeton and Withleigh had reached the semi-finals of the Criss-cross-quiz.

Washfield's AGM had seen a presentation to Ron and Grace Herniman as they prepared for Ron to take up duties as Archdeacon of Barnstaple. The village outing was to be to Paignton in July.

NATURE NOTES

was introduced to moss at a relatively early age during bob-a-Job. [Sorry kids, you will have to Google this] I had to clear a path armed with salt and a scraper and it took the best part of the day. The lady rewarded me with a bob and my parents thought it was child exploitation.

As the mists and the dampness rolled in day after day I was reminded of these times known to all who hail from the west of Britain. People from Northumberland to Kent know cold but they have little long term experience of the clinging dampness that chills or the humidity that can softly envelop.

The algae, moss and lichen have enjoyed the climate and clean air of Devon for centuries and it often takes visitors to remark on how vigorous the growth is.

Of course many industrial towns are now seeing the re-establishment of lichen as they now contend with only vehicle emissions rather than the sulphur dioxide which managed to defeat virtually all of the 130 varieties in the past.

By far the most striking in our locality is the bushy Oakmoss which is light green with small antler like fronds, and grows on the trees from which it takes its name. It is not uncommon to find balls of this on the ground as the rain and branches fall during the last throes of winter.

Lichens have the most exotic Latin names to perhaps make up for how little we notice them. One that I associate with the brighter weather to come is the golden or yellow form that colonises ancient stones. I therefore think of limestone scars, dry stone walls, the coast and grand country houses or castles .These lichen seem to be a fitting adornment to the stone and a natural addition in a landscape that has remained the same for centuries.

I do not feel the same about moss and cannot avoid a feeling of discomfort when viewing trees and hedgerow branches permanently wearing a damp overcoat all winter.

I hope we get many florists visiting this summer for their holidays, and that they take some home.

Ramblings from Oasis Westland, Cruwys Arms Gardeners

I have always fed the birds in a haphazard kind of way but motivated by the end of month RSPB Bird Count, the cold weather and, yes, lock down I took it to a whole new level.

My bedroom window feeding station is transformed. First off I cleaned the window, what an improvement! It has the traditional small panes, three sections or panels with the central one being the one that opens. (You know what I mean, the sort you see in Devon farmhouses and cottages everywhere) On the left hand section the peanut feeder hangs from the eaves, then there is the suction held transparent dish and on the window ledge itself a tray built up to glass level. The ledge is narrow and the tray takes up the full width. With the window closed the ledge on the first two sections acts as a landing strip for the heavier birds and when open it stops easy access for the never satisfied Wood Pigeons.

It is pre dawn and I have woken early. My bed is opposite the window and the curtains never drawn. I go down to make a cup of tea then back with it to my warm bed to watch the drama unfold in comfort.

The Robin is the first to appear. This makes sense, with their large eyes they can forage in dim light and it is a long way from full dawn.







HOW TO MAKE A PALM CROSS



<u>CHILDREN'S PAGE</u> A Story for Mothering Sunday

Not many people are christened Clementina. I suppose it's hardly a fashioable name nowadays but this story is about a girl who was called just that.

Clementina was, on the whole, a very charming and likeable 11 year old. She could even be extremely kind and thoughtful on occcasions, as you will see from my story; but alongside that there was also an ever so slightly devious side to her character.

Clementina lived with her mum, dad and two younger sisters in a pleasant suburb of a large city. In addition her granny lived close by and Clementina was paticulary fond of her, so she was often round there on visits after school.

At the time of this story it happened to be the week of her ganny's 60th birthday. Clementina had decided that she would buy a present and she knew just the right thing to purchase. She had seen it in the corner shop. It was a large and very pretty box of delicious MacCrumbs homemade chocolate biscuits, wrapped up with a beautiful pink bow. Now you may think this was a strange idea for a present but the truth is that these were granny's favourites - and also, incidently, they were Clementina's, but that had nothing to do with her choice, of course!

There was, however, one snag. This beautifully decorated present cost £5.99 and unfortunately Clementina had already spent all her pocket money that week. She hadn't been able to resist a bumper edition of her regular music magazine, especially as it carried a picture of her favourite celebrity on the front cover. But this meant she had no money left over. What was she to do? Clementina had a good think and then came up with her big idea.

After a week during which she was particularly and, I must confess unusually helpful around the house. Clementina sat down on Friday evening to write a letter to her mum. This is what it said:

Dear Mum, Here is my bill for last week's work; Cleaning shoes - 80p Helping with the shopping - £1.20 Feeding the dog (seven days at 20p a day) - £1.40 Washing up (sometimes) - £1 Laying the table each night - 60p Tidying up my room - 99p Total - £5.99 Love Clementina



She placed the letter in an envelope and left it on the sideboard so that Mum would see it after Clementina had gone to bed.

The following morning Clementina came down to breakfast and glanced over at the sideboard. To her delight she saw the letter had been opened and that another letter addressed to her lay there in its place. She opened it quickly and this is what she read;

Dear Clemetina,

Enclosed £5.99 and many thanks for all your help. Now here is my bill:

Feeding and clothing you for 11 years - Op Nursing you through measles, chicken pox etc - Op Transport to Brownies, swimming, gymnastics, parties etc - Op Cost of holidays and entertainment for 11 years - Op Total - Op

Suddenly Clementina felt humbled indeed and for the first time she realised just what her mother's love really involved and that it was all given free. Clementina learned a big lesson that day and the next time Mothering Sunday came around it somehow meant a great deal more to her than ever before, as she thought back to the letter her mother had written. It was a letter - rather like her name! - never to be forgotten.

He (or she) makes straight for the tray with a seed mix and, Robin heaven, meal worms. Then comes the tit family – Blue, Great and Coal Tits. They ignore the peanuts and go for the sunflower hearts in the 'grab and go' transparent dish. Just beyond the window is the observation and feeding post pear tree. The sunflower seeds are held on to the twiggy branches by tenacious feet and devoured. Coal Tits are the masters of this game.

Bang, crash, clatter the stock doves have arrived. They have been watching from the mature beech tree beyond. Everything else retreats to the pear tree. In a line two of them waddle up the runway and the first tucks in to the seed tray bounty. There is only room for one at a time so the other has to wait – what a long wait – – – The first rays of morning sun catches the iridescent mauve and turquoise patch on its neck – wow! O.K., that's enough, one flap of the duvet cover and they are gone.

Now the male Blackbird creeps up. He is nervous, a ground feeder by choice but oh dear, the cats and the snow. He sits on the runway for an age whilst the other small birds return. Then a fast approach, a meal worm and its off to the tree.

Now it is daylight and the House Sparrows turn up mob handed. Untidy feeders scattering seed everywhere including the path below where more of their mates are grateful recipients.

Last of all comes King, or is it Queen, Nuthatch. A total takeover bid – well just look at that beak.

He or she doesn't stay long, the preference is for the grab and go sunflower seeds but there are frequent returns and in the intervals the lowly small birds jump in, especially the tits. Time to get up. I feel happy to have shared quiet time with my feathered garden residents. I would like to have others share it with me but with the lock down moratorium on indoor meetings, that is not going to happen but pleased that they can top up what food they find in the garden without expending too much energy. I look forward hopefully to a loud dawn chorus and a bountiful Spring of nestlings.

Lambing season is almost upon us and serves as a reminder that life in our beautiful part of the countryside goes on.

Church Services

Ultrafast Broadband in Templeton – an update. The recent road closures have allowed the tree trimming, pole replacement and cable laying to be completed. You may still see BNE (Barden Network Engineering Ltd) company vans around as they 'splice' all the fibres together and test them.

The next step is for Openreach to install fibre from the new network into our houses and fit what is effectively a new Master Socket. Due to COVID restrictions and the engineers selfisolating, we don't have dates for this yet but the process will be underway shortly.

If you receive a letter or a phone call from BT about your existing 'slow' broadband service, please don't respond to it. It has been superseded by our Templeton Ultrafast Broadband project.

Templeton's public rights of way

The countryside around Templeton is beautiful. The footpaths, bridleways and byways in our parish have been so important, particularly over the last year. It is vital that we maintain and create walking routes so that the countryside and our towns and cities may be explored on foot. Over 49,000 miles of historic paths – enough to stretch around the world nearly twice - are missing from the official maps in England and Wales. More than a fifth of the lost paths are in the South West of England (over 9,000 miles) with Devon

topping the list of counties with the most rights of way missing. These paths are a vital part of our heritage, yet if they are not reclaimed for inclusion on the definitive map (the legal record of rights of way) by January 2026, we risk losing them forever, as after this time, it will no longer be possible to add paths to the definitive map based on historic evidence.

Devon County Council has been carrying out a definitive map review of the public rights of way in the parishes across the whole of Devon, and Templeton parish is now their main focus. Please see poster on page 19.
