MID DEVON MESSENGER - HOW WE THRIVED DURING LOCKDOWN

Many of you will know about the Mid Devon Messenger – a free local talking newspaper for the blind and visually impaired, and a registered charity.

All had been running smoothly for nearly 40 years... until lockdown! Overnight we had to evacuate the studio at Heathcoat Fabrics in Tiverton, put our heads together and come up with a plan. With a little ingenuity and bags of determination, we switched to a whole new way of working without missing a heartbeat – or even a single week's delivery.

At first, Rod and Helen produced the recordings each week, reading news, articles, quizzes, interviews and entertainment from the Gazette, parish magazines and elsewhere. We were upbeat, knowing the last thing our listeners needed was more bad news.

When the dust settled we were joined by 20 of our readers who adapted to a 5 week roster, recording at home using their mobile phones or laptops, emailing their recorded tracks to the technician of the week. Despite all the complications, it's been working a treat and listeners are happy - though volunteers do miss getting together in the studio!

Our listeners have often told us that when the yellow MDM pouch drops on their mat on a Thursday morning, it's like a friend has come to visit. One recording had been 'a real pick-me-up, like a nice glass of wine!' We're so glad we haven't had to stop visiting, and have been able to do something to alleviate the isolation and loneliness that have been such a sad feature of the lockdown.

We are now extending our **free** service to others who struggle to read a paper and keep in contact. People suffering from Parkinson's, stroke, rheumatoid arthritis, dementia and other disabilities may want to receive the Messenger and continue to feel a part of their community.

NATURE NOTES

Somewhat late in life I have just finished 'Tarka the Otter'

Like Dickens, Shakespeare and medicine there is much to be said for leaving them out of reach of children until a dose can be appropriately measured and used.

This classic, despite N. Devon folk considering Williamson to be mazed, is a great and lyrical presentation of the British countryside and the lives of wild animals.

It is not an easy read as the tension concerning the fragility of life and difficulty of finding food [viz. eat or be eaten] cannot be escaped.

Although the long shadow of the Great War is seen in this book the message is universal even when dressed in a fiction, but the author's generation probably deserved more escapism.

I most enjoyed being transported to Braunton Burrows again, and realised by a strange coincidence that my first sighting of an otter in daylight was on Romney Marsh. These are strange lands where the walking is easy and the distant horizon bends around you. It is easy to see a very long way, and understandably the movement of animals is furtive and sudden such that you are uncertain of what you glimpsed -the slither of an eel?; the twitching movement of a tall grass by an unseen agent?

They are lonely and haunting places and yet comforting to the mind and imagination, especially when accompanied by the cry of a curlew or owl or if the mist envelops you. It is not wild as the moor is wild, and winds can be gentle. You are ever conscious of the sea or major estuaries just beyond your sight and reach, and the twice daily delivery on the tide of at least some food for those higher in the food chain a repeated blessing.

The otter is at home whether in water or marsh but would that they were as numerous as frogs. I have been on Shoreham marshes [yes, where Pip unexpectedly met Magwitch] in the height of summer and been deafened by the croaks of unseen male frogs. However if you want to see otters I suggest a visit to Scotland and on the visit you may wish to read 'that other otter book'

Some of you may have noticed on the Holy Communion Welcome Sheet (St Peter's Tiverton) the words 10 am Morning Prayer on line and given no further thought to it, others may have decided they could have no use for it, but yet others might be curious to know more.

Many assumed it was just an emergency stop gap measure while the church was closed and that once services restarted it would have served its need and closed down. We could not have been further from the truth. Many, especially the older amongst us, have really appreciated an alternative way to worship and we think numbers will swell further when winter arrives. There are some who never make it to church for real and some others lucky enough to manage both. Although those joining Zoom may be under 20 in number, those just using their phones swell our congregation to well over 40. So you don't need to use a computer to take part. But we get a stimulating sermon and help with the readings from a lav member. Sometimes its a familiar face such as Nickie Johnson or Jenny Palmer, at other times somebody from the other parishes whom we soon get to know. The whole thing is over in 25 minutes vet seems to contain all the essentials. So if ever you feel a bit under the weather or any other reason cannot make it in person why not give it a try.
