NATURE NOTES

I must say the bindweed is flourishing in the time of drought, and other greenery like trees and shrubs have done incredibly well to provide oases across our Devon landscape. The cows in their parched pasture seem to look longingly at our relatively green garden but it has not had much more water than their brown, exposed meadows.

I was once asked to clear the beds of a garden of bindweed, so I asked the advice of а very experienced professional gardener. She looked at me with some puzzlement and said I should just cultivate the bindweed out. This was not a welcome answer for the modern World where convenience, minimum cost and instant solutions are demanded. I cannot say I was keen either, but I am proud to say I did a proper job and found it quite rewarding to chase the parsnip coloured roots back along to their origin. Google says the roots can last for four decades but I was not to know that at the time.

Such enthusiasm doesn't now extend to our own garden and the trumpet shaped flowers threading within the garden boundaries gleam white in the evening dusk as we contentedly enjoy the remains of these lovely days.

Thanks to similar inattention and being away, the blackbirds did an amazing job over a few days in stripping gooseberry and currant bushes using holes or gaps in the netting in a way that still remains a mystery. Presumably they now expect me to trim



their hedge so that they can comfortably look forward to next year.

Farmers must see gardeners' battles as very minor but no doubt they too know when nature has again edged things out of their control.

There may be much gloom in Britain but the welcome return of the County and the flower/ produce shows provide a great confidence boost and a reminder of what we can achieve.

I would also urge you to refer to another Oasis for calm and remember there is an importance of being idle {especially for those used to hard work}, or as one gardener put it 'whatever the garden enjoy the weather.'

Our Beautiful Churchyard.

Churchyards were once managed in a very similar way to the farmed grassland that surrounded them. The last century had seen a dramatic change in farming practices and much of the biodiversity in the farmed landscape has been lost as a result. Often the way churchyards have been managed has remained unchanged for centuries so, with very limited use of herbicides and pesticides, some are now a precious refuge for both our flora and fauna. Cruwys Morchard churchyard is an excellent example of such a churchyard and it has recently been recognised as such by "Caring for God's Acre" www.caringforgodsacre.org.uk) as one

www.caringforgodsacre.org.uk) as one of their "churchyards to inspire". In a recent survey over eighty pant species were identified. In June Stephen Powles took ten or more interested souls to look at "Gods own acre" looking for the natural plants and grasses, it was lovely to watch so many people enjoying our Church Yard. They had not realised that the large area without any head stones was full of graves, the grass has now had its summer cut, so the graves are clear to see. The yard will be cut again in October, ready for the winter and spring flowers to grow.

A Harvest Moon is the name given to the full moon closest to the autumn equinox, which this year will fall on 10 September 2022 in the UK. The name Harvest Moon dates back to a time long



before electricity, when farmers depended on the Moon's light to harvest their crops late into the night. These days of course, they can still be out there tractoring at all hours – that much has never changed.

a defibrillator, it was agreed that Templeton Village Hall would purchase the iPAD SP1 fully automatic AED with a heated External Defibsafe2 Cabinet, along with a free basic life support training kit.
