## NATURE NOTES

There is much talk in the village about Winter dragging on too long. You cannot help thinking this is a bit unfair and perhaps more a reflection of the mood - as in 'now is the Winter of our discontent'.

Although no-ones' favourite season, there is much to be said for the chance to turn off for a while and recharge the batteries.

The amazement of childhood when first discovering some animals hibernate has shown no signs of abating. When I think of animals as disparate as tortoises and bears undertaking this option it is tempting to believe we all could do it. Then again would this not deny us so much?

What can compare with the moment you take the blackcurrants out of the freezer and then allow them to defrost? The same smell that covered you when you picked them, spreads right across the kitchen and the ghosts of summers past or those to come is very real in that Winter moment. The yearly arrival of clear starlit nights and the stillness of the valley cloaked in a hoar frost do not invoke feelings of vulnerability but a feeling of home.

In fact it is the resourcefulness of all nature [with or without man's ability to preserve food] to get through periods of harsh weather and food scarcity that needs to be both celebrated and admired. It is probably the humble, likeable and half blind mole that exemplifies this. They bite and subject worms to toxins in their food stores and then come to consume them whilst still alive at a later date. [I am sure they lose their caches just like squirrels judging from the state of the lawn]

This year, Winter and the cost of living crisis have contrived to make the once routine weekly visit to man's food stores very demanding even without the blatant profiteering that is simple to avoid. I used to laugh at the war time generations that saw fit to continue to store tins in wardrobes rather than clothes deep into the last century, only to find it is yet again a good idea. I am a huge fan of Italian tinned tomatoes because I now see it as a good attempt to capture the sunlight, goodness and taste. My teacher taught me to describe tomatoes as fruit, but I can assure her those pale orange and perfectly formed things from Holland are vegetables.

Certainly it is hard to get through the dark months without the joy of citrus fruits in season or the taste of apples that shine through our ciders, [although there are some that manage to make ciders with no taste of apples at all]

I think we owe it to Nature's bounty to consume less and wisely irrespective of the season so saving the planet, taste buds and sanity.

But March is here:

The reservoirs are almost full (due to all that rain). Maybe we can drive or take the village bus to nearby towns to shop instead of shopping on line thus doing away with the stress of missing deliveries.

The birds are beginning to sing and very soon there will be new lambs out in the fields to make us smile. Buds and bulbs and snowdrops are appearing in gardens and hedgerows everywhere. Unfortunately we do still have to dodge

the potholes. Please everyone keep reporting them to Devon County Council.

#### St Peter's Oakford news.

Fund raising for the bell tower is still ongoing. There is a lot of interest in the bells throughout the community. Oakford is lucky to have a peal of eight bells which are able to produce a splendid sound for weddings and special occasions as well as calling villagers to church services. Here are a few interesting facts about the bells of St Peter's Church.

The oldest part of St Peter's Church is the 15th century tower. In 1549 during the reign of the child King Edward V1, the 'Protector Somerset' ordered that the bells in all churches of Devon and Cornwall be taken down and the clappers confiscated.

However, Churches were soon allowed to buy back their bells and by 1553 when Mary came to the throne, the silenced bells were ringing again.

Unfortunately this was not the case in Oakford as at the time St Peter's was reported as the only church in the county with no bells. 1577 and William Hyll Spurway gave  $\pounds$ 3 to help buy a bell.

200 years later in 1760 it was recorded in an inventory of the church that the tower had 5 bells. In 1813 James Parkin inr became Oakford's new Rector and he remained so for the rest of his life. It was the Reverend Parkin who generously presented to Oakford the peal of 8 bells that still ring in St Peter's Church today. They were said to be among the best sounding bells in Devon and many ringers came from across the county wanting to try them.

### Does your Community group need funding ?

You may already be aware of the Batsworthy Cross Community Benefit Fund - which has been in place since 2016. The Fund is focused on encouraging and sustaining all aspects of community life and supporting rural regeneration in the area around the Batsworthy Cross Wind Farm. Many different projects have been funded over recent years in the 'area of benefit', which includes the 10 parishes of Bishops Nympton, East Anstey, East Worlington, Knowstone, Meshaw, Molland, Oakford, Rackenford & Creacombe, Rose Ash and West Anstey. A lot of the projects supported so far have focused on keeping community buildings in good order which is obviously really important. But there are lots of other ways the funding could support life in your local community too, so we'd love to see some more applications from groups for projects that are bringing people together - whether that's via Memory Cafes or sports clubs, out of school activities for children and young people, community energy projects or transport schemes – whatever helps sustain and encourage your local community life. The Fund is managed by Devon Community Foundation (DCF) who assess any

applications received, but the final decisions are made by a panel of local people from across the parishes listed.
