NATURE NOTES

"Swifties"

By the time that you read these notes

our swifts will be back in central Africa and Taylor Swift's Eras Tour will have ended. Did you see or hear either of them?!

For some "swifties" the enjoyment of watching a tight formation of our fastest bird (in level flight) scything through the air and listening to their unmistakeable "screaming parties" (as their flypasts are known) is about as good as it gets for summertime entertainment. However, these "swifties" are in the minority.

Thought to number 500 million, the remaining "swifties" (the name given to Taylor Swift's fan base) seek an altogether different, and costly, experience as they pack themselves into vast arenas to watch their megastar idol perform live on stage. In contrast, if one is fortunate enough to have swifts nesting nearby, these swifts can be experienced for free and by simply stepping outside one's front door.

For both "swifties" alike, the time spent in the UK by the focus of their admiration will have been all too fleeting. The swifts that grace our skies arrive in early May and most have departed by early August. Faithful to their previous nest sites, they have a three-month window in which to pair up, raise a brood of two or three chicks then feed up before heading back south.

It's hard to believe, but, having left their

unlikely to land again until it resumes breeding the following year or, in the case of recent fledglings, up to four years later when they themselves start breeding. Feeding, drinking, sleeping and mating are all done on the wing.

With mouths gaping wide open, each swift is estimated to hoover up 20,000 insects every day. A large proportion of their diet consists of aphids, mosquitos and small spiders that have become airborne.

When bad weather local to the nest site is not conducive to feeding, swifts can fly several hundred miles to avoid a soaking and to find food. By dropping their body temperature, the chicks are specially adapted to survive several days without food.

The older ones amongst us will remember the summers when our car windscreens were splattered with numerous small insects that had met an untimely end in a high-speed collision. This is seldom the case now. Insect numbers are thought to have declined by 50% since the 1970s. Whilst car windscreens have benefited from the lack of insect life, birds that depend on them for food and to rear their young have struggled.

Surveys indicate that swift populations have plummeted to one third of what they were in 1995. The reasons behind the decline are unknown but a loss of insects is likely to be a contributing factor. Swifts nest primarily in buildings, often under roofs and in walls.

The loss of suitable nest sites is thought to be a key driver of falling swift numbers. The modernisation of old buildings has seen many of their nesting opportunities disappear and new builds rarely have the necessary nooks and crannies that offer suitable nest sites.

By using fewer chemicals in our gardens and the wider countryside, we can help swifts and the ecosystems on which they and we are all ultimately dependant. As regards nest sites, we are urged not to block up, disturb or remove established nest sites and to create new ones by installing swift nest boxes on our homes, swift bricks in new builds and nest boxes in or on our churches.

"Swifties" have recently installed over 50 boxes behind the louvres in the tower of St Michael and All Angels Church in Bampton.

Are you a "swiftie"? If not, how about it?

St Margaret's Church – Update As you will be aware, thanks to the ongoing work at our church and churchyard, St Margaret's Church is being well maintained for future generations to enjoy. This year we have been rewarded with an abundance of wild flowers, especially the beautiful orange Hawkweed. This plant has many nicknames including 'Fox-andcubs' and even, strangely enough, the 'Devil's paintbrush.' A big thank you to Peter who regularly cuts the grass in the churchyard and maintains it so well. The interior walls of the church still need expert attention and special paint. Adrian and his team have done a lovely job to expose the stonework surrounding the windows. It looks stunning. Because of the costs incurred, the work is being carried out

in stages. Every five years the church has to undergo a Quinquennial Review which involves a qualified chartered surveyor conducting a visual inspection of the building and its state of repair. This has just been carried out and the findings were positive, although more work on the church is needed to maintain the building in good order.
