### **NATURE NOTES**

The Twelve Days of Christmas - what's it all about?

Over the festive period there is every chance that you will sing, or recite, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" but have you ever wondered what it's all about? The twelve days start on Christmas Day and end on the day before Epiphany (6th January).

The origin of the carol is not entirely clear. Thought to have originated well before in the spoken word, it was first written down in the late eighteenth century. One commonly held theory has it being a "memory and forfeits" game, suggested forfeits being to offer a kiss or confectionary. The game would have been played at family gatherings between Christmas and Epiphany.

What can we make of its references to wildlife? Once again, their roots and reasons for being included are not always obvious nor fully understood.

The partridge may represent Jesus Christ, faith and holy love. In the UK the grey partridge is associated with lowland farmland and occurs largely in the east of the country. Once relatively common, its numbers have declined dramatically with changing farming practices.

In Mid Devon we are far more likely to see non-native red-legged partridges as they are often released by shooting estates.

The two turtle doves are said to correspond to the Old and New Testaments. Thought to be monogamous and mating for life, turtle doves symbolise love and faithfulness. They too are found on lowland farms and, as with the grey partridge, have declined for similar reasons. They are now rare in the UK and are very rare in Devon.

The four calling birds are often associated with blackbirds and the four gospels and symbolise good news, joy and spreading the message of Christ's birth. The blackbird is one of our commonest birds and much loved for its melodious and vociferous song delivered from a prominent tree top or chimney pot. Six geese a-laying link to the six days of creation, fertility and new life. Canada geese, with their black and white head and neck, are non-native but commonplace in Devon. Greylag geese too are relatively common but have a grey/brown neck and head with a distinctive orange bill. "Greylags" are the ancestor of our domestic geese, thought to have originated in Egypt 3,000 years ago.

The Seven swans a-swimming relate to the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit or the seven sacraments and imply grace, transformation and beauty. There are three native swan species in the UK, the Mute swan being the one commonly seen on our lakes and rivers. Bewick and Whooper swans are far less common and only winter in the UK, choosing to breed further north in and around the arctic.

My memory for lyrics has never been up to much so I won't be playing a "memory and forfeit" game involving the "Twelve Days of Christmas" during the festive period (or any other such games if I can avoid them). However, when I next sing the "Twelve Days of Christmas" or see a reference to them, I will spare a thought for the birds themselves, what they represent and the true meaning of Christmas.

### WHAT'S ON .....

The past few weeks have been a momentous time for the Church of England, in particular the Makin Review leading to the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the first for hundreds of years.—as referred to by Steph on page 1.

These events were such that Washfield PCC met to discuss them and decided that it was important that the laity should not remain mute.

The following letter was sent to the Bishop of Exeter and we felt that you should see it.

#### WASHFIELD PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL 11/12/24

Dear Bishop,

I am writing to you following a meeting of the Washfield PCC (a parish within the Exe Valley Community) to consider the Makin Review and the subsequent resignation of Archbishop Welby. We think it important that the laity is not mute following what has emerged from this review. We wish to express our dismay and anger over these events, in particular the behaviour of some senior members of the Church of England over many years.

It is important that there is proper accountability and those implicated stand down.

We note the explanation of Archbishop Welby's departure in your recent Ad Clerum –"---Archbishop Justin resigned after taking personal and institutional responsibility-----".

Were the entire media incorrect in reporting that he chose not to resign following the publication of the Review? Most people believe that he was forced out by pressure from the media and certain members of the clergy, typically the younger element.

This sort of obfuscation does the church no credit and reinforces the impression of the "old guard" closing ranks and indulging in damage mitigation rather than openness and transparency.

Since we started this event in 2012, we have filled 9 industrial size skips with general metal and four cattle trailers with aluminum, copper, brass and stainless steel. In total, over the four scrap metal events we have now raised a total of £7,727.77 for the village funds.

Several events happened after we wrote the Templeton page of the magazine. Here's what we know and what we think we know. Fingers crossed:
